## MASTER'S ANNUAL ADDRESS INTRODUCTION

As we opened the 108th annual convention of the California State Grange today we were reminded, that it was forty-two years ago, in 1938, that the State Grange held its first annual session in Southern California. Since that time, there has been substantial Grange growth in the southern part of our state and it now enjoys the respect of not only this, but all communities of California.

The membership of the Grange in our Southern Counties have been untiring in their efforts in arranging the plans for this State Convention, which we believe will be one of the

largest state farm gatherings to be held in California.

We cannot overstate our appreciation for the leadership of Convention Chairman Harleigh Gallup, Deputy State Master of Riverside County and Co-Chairman Charles Ross, Master of Riverside County Pomona Grange and the Grange leaders in San Diego, Orange, San Bernardino and Los Angeles Counties. Their preparation for this convention is greatly appreciated.

The National Grange was closely associated in the development of the Naval Orange Industry in California. William Saunders, first Master of the National Grange, then Federal Commissioner of Agriculture, was greatly interested in developing tropical or semi-tropical fruits in some areas of the United States. To enhance this plan, he sent to Brazil for a shipment of twelve Naval Orange trees. All of the first shipment died, but later another shipment was received and out of this second group of trees, William Saunders sent one to Mrs. Tibbitts of Riverside and it was the first Naval Orange tree to survive in the United States.

Through the great foresight of William Saunders came the great Naval Orange Industry in California. Our Grange organization can have an unpardonable pride in the work of one of its founders and the first Master of the National Grange.

At no time have the issues been greater than today, not only to California farmers but to American Agriculture. Many of these issues will be considered at this convention. We may not always agree in our discussion of resolutions, but we must always keep in mind that the Grange moves on majority rule. The Grange takes great pride that its program is developed from its membership through qualified delegates.

#### **NATIONAL WELFARE**

#### **Balance The Budget**

The California State Grange and the National Grange have for years adopted a policy position calling for a balanced National budget. Leadership in Congress and the White House have consistently ignored the cry of the people. The Grange will not be silenced, nor satisfied, until the elected leadership of the United States is accountable to the mandate of the people to balance the National budget and restore economic

stability.

There are two basic ways to balance the budget: cut government spending by eliminating waste and unnecessary services, or by increasing taxes. The people of the United States have spoken clearly as to how they feel about increasing taxes, and yet it is estimated Americans will pay \$92 billion more to the federal government in 1981, than in 1980 — an increase of \$1,200 per family. These increases come in different forms and include: approximately \$16 billion in "Windfall profits" that will be passed on to the people in higher prices; 3 billion from increased withholding requirements; and \$26 billion will be paid in higher Social Security taxes; but most tragic of this trend is the boost in taxes Americans will pay because of inflation. The raises you receive to keep up with a spiraling consumer price index do not necessarily give you more to spend. For every 10 percent pay raise you earn this year, the government automatically collects 16 percent higher taxes. As a result, the federal government in 1981 will collect almost \$36 billion more in individual income taxes. Fully half of that figure results from inflation. The delegate body should take some stand on the benefits of "indexing" a means whereby pay raises granted to keep up with inflation are NOT taxed in a higher income tax bracket.

Balancing the budget is a step in the right direction, but there is a more fundamental lesson to be learned. I think Woodrow Wilson said it best, "Liberty has never come from the government . . . the history of liberty is the history of the limitations of governmental power, not the increase of it."

We all know that neither man, nor business, nor government can continue to spend more money than is received without the end result being bankruptcy. The complex system known as the free market operates without conscious supervision or direction. Each consumer "votes" with his dollars in the market place. The result of these individual decisions has made the history of American capitalism—in which 28 percent of the total production of the human race is created by only 5 percent of the world's population. The most amazing thing about our economic system is what is absent. The fact is, wealth emerges from the lack of government control.

What made us what we are today is individual liberty. The Grange was founded on this concept and will fight to keep it. We must use our votes in the market place and at the voting booth to support those leaders who feel the government

is the problem, not the solution.

#### Inheritance Tax

On July 19, Governor Brown signed legislation which will substantially reduce inheritance and gift taxes paid by Californians. The bill, AB 2092, takes effect January 1, 1981. It

fully exempts spouses from the State Inheritance Tax, increases exemptions for all other classes of beneficiaries and excludes from taxation 40% to 50% of those classes of estates now taxes under current law. Farms and closely held businesses may be valued on the basis of current use of the property, rather than the higher fair market value and they may qualify for deferral of tax payment up to 15 years, with no payment due for 5 years. Inheritance and gift taxes will be cut overall by 27%.

Grange policy calls for inheritance tax relief, and specific concurrence by the Grange Interim Agriculture Committee led to the increased exemptions allowed under AB 2092.

Although ultimate relief would include a complete repeal of the State Interitance Tax laws, the issue is somewhat confused at the moment. Several months ago the Miller Initiative was circulated seeking signatures, and while it did not qualify for the November, 1980 ballot, it appears that sufficient qualified signatures may have been obtained to assure it a spot on a future election ballot. This petition, however, may have a constitutional problem.

In the meantime, Assemblyman Don Rogers has started circulating petitions to qualify his proposal to repeal the State Inheritance Tax laws, and he is actively seeking support financially, and in getting volunteers to circulate petitions.

On the heels of the inheritance tax reform bill for California, legislation was introduced in Congress that would extensively modify current federal estate and gift tax laws.

As proposed, the bill would exempt spouses from all estate and gift taxes on inherited property.

S-2967 contains some of the most extensive reforms of the federal estate and gift tax law for farms and family businesses over the past 40 years. There is a need to help young people who lack the capital to buy farms. Parents find they can't transfer the farm to their own children.

A cosponsor of the bill claims it would provide tax relief to 95 percent of family-owned farms and businesses.

Besides the bill's provision relating to a surviving spouse, it would also increase from \$175,000 to \$500,000 the amount of property that could be passed on to anyone without paying federal estate and gift taxes.

Another provision of the bill would double to \$6,000 the amount of property a person may give tax-free annually to another. It would also simplify the "special use valuation rule" for farms and other closely-held business property for estate purposes to provide for consideration of whether a qualified heir is old, young or disabled.

Under the current law, farmers or heirs may be discouraged from hiring non-family members to operate the farm because they could lose the special use valuation advantage.

Delegates at this session need to take a position on this issue to give the State Grange a clear mandate.

#### **AGRICULTURE**

#### State Of The Industry

The agricultural industry is facing a severe crisis in America today.

First, an average of over 700 family farms went out of business each week last year. The steadily declining number of family farms was one of the factors that prompted Agriculture Secretary, Bob Bergland, to call for a national dialogue on the future of agriculture. The California State Grange took full advantage of the opportunity to express the problems facing the family farmer in America.

Second, the U.S.D.A. has reported a bleak picture for farm income this year. Net farm income . . . roughly the amount left over after farmers pay production expenses will be down as much as 30 percent through the first three quarters of 1980. Cash receipts from all crops and livestock will continue to increase this year, possibly by as much as 4 percent. The reduction in net farm income will be the direct result of much higher production costs.

Third, an estimated loss of nearly 3 million acres of farmland this past year is another source of concern of the Grange. It is essential a study be undertaken to explore ways to stem a loss of cropland to development, such as suburbs and shop-

ping centers.

Fourth, pesticide restrictions being placed on farmers by the Environmental Protection Agency, the United States Department of Agriculture, and now the California Department of Food and Agriculture seem to be shaping a policy of removing many essential agricultural chemicals from the market.

More than any other single industry, agriculture accounts for over a quarter of the balance-of-trade payments returned to this country. The direction being taken with pesticide controls is counter productive. The food supply grown in the United States is the safest and the best the world has ever known. We spend less than 20 percent of our disposable income on food which is a record throughout the world and throughout history. A major dislocation of our agricultural economy will damage our national economy. If there is one essential industry, agriculture is that industry. History has proven time and again that a nation must be able to feed itself and have products to export or it is in great economic danger. Statisticians are projecting a necessary increase in food production of over 54 percent in the next 20 years to accommodate the increasing world population. The restrictions now being placed on agriculture are lessening the productivity of the American farmer instead of allowing it to increase.

The agricultural crisis in America began when Americans lost touch with their roots that came from the soil. Almost every American family has at one time been closely associated with farming. Our culture, heritage, and history are closely tied to the success story of agriculture productivity. The people of this country need to recognize the role agriculture played in our past, and should realize its present and future importance for the welfare of our nation. It is time that agriculture receive the respect and reverence that is due an industry that afforded us an industrial revolution, through its export pays a major part of our imported oil to run our modern economy, and if given a chance will lead the United States back to World prominence.

#### **Agricultural Labor**

The California State Grange has a proud history of standing up for the agricultural laborers of California. It is the Grangers of California that have worked side by side with their farmhands and know how tough it can be. The Grange supported unemployment insurance for farm workers, tighter regulations concerning farmworker safety and still maintains that the farmer and farm worker are a team and when farmers begin to get a fair share of the food dollar, benefits for farm workers will follow. Farmers and farm workers should not allow the state promoted Unions to interfere, divide and put us at odds when we know that if we work for each others benefit, both parties end up better off.

To this end the agricultural industry made great strides this year when the Senate refused to confirm Gerald Brown as chairman of the Agriculture Labor Relations Board. It was well known and documented that the board under the leadership of Mr. Brown was highly biased toward the Unions in

their dealings with California farmers.

The Grange supported the Agricultural Labor Relations Act of 1975 knowing full well that it was not perfect. Since that time, it has become obvious that biased leadership can twist the best intent of any legislation. It was the contention of the Grange to allow the farm worker the right to *choose* whether he or she would or would not like to be associated with a Union. The state, on the other hand, feels that beyond simply making the alternatives known to the farmworkers, their job is to promote that Union. It is not the proper function of the state to promote a Union.

The Grange requests that the Agriculture Labor Relations Board function in a proper and unbiased manner which will allow the farm workers of this state the freedom of choice.

#### **CONSERVATION**

#### Wild and Scenic Rivers

California enacted its Wild and Scenic Rivers Act in 1972. Its provisions are specifically designed to meet local and statewide situations for protection and management of these

rivers. These functions have been carried out effectively and in the public interest by state and local officials. The California legislature has reserved judgement as to how these rivers and their related land resources are to be managed in the future. The legislature has authorized and funded detailed management studies of these rivers systems and has mandated that the results of the studies be reported to the legislature for approval before they can become effective or be implemented. To date none of the plans have been approved, and only two have been submitted for legislative review.

The California State Grange opposed both management plans. It is our opinion that local and county plans basically incorporate all the necessary criteria to comply with the California Wild and Scenic Rivers Act. Also, that an enabling management approach would provide incentive for local management to move thoroughly and quickly to comply to a broad management plan.

The State of California appears to want sole control of managing the Wild and Scenic Rivers and their related land resources. To this end, Governor Brown, acting on behalf of the State of California, has requested that the five rivers, including specific tributaries, which are currently included in the California Wild and Scenic Rivers System, be added to the National Wild and Scenic Rivers System. The California Resources Agency has the primary responsibility for filing California's application which requires providing a permanent State administrative plan to protect the designated rivers and their related land resources.

The rivers that Governor Brown requested to be incorporated into the Federal Wild and Scenic Rivers System include the American, Eel, Klamath, Smith and Trinity rivers.

With the exception of the American River, all these rivers involved are located on California's north coast above San Francisco. Each river drains areas within the national forest system, and their watersheds support a variety of commercial activity, including the timber and mining industries, that significantly contribute to the economy of the areas involved.

These north coast rivers also represent a significant percentage of the uncontrolled runoff in California today. Any future water needs of the state should include careful consideration of these rivers which have an average annual runoff of approximately 22,000,000 acre-feet. I know that you are well aware that California's water shortage is a real serious issue that must be resolved.

These rivers are not presently designated for any specific water project proposals either at the federal, state or local levels, and thus there does not appear to be any justification for the apparent urgency and priority that is being assigned to the Governor's request. Already an accelerated review initiated by the Interior Deaprtment's Heritage Conservation and Recreation Service has taken place which hindered the accomplishment of a complete and comprehensive evaluation.

It would be appropriate for the delegates to the 108th California State Grange convention to establish policy on the fate of our north coast rivers.

#### **Farmland Preservation**

Concern is growing about the amount of farmland being converted to urban and other nonagricultural uses. Estimates of the loss range from 3 to 5 million acres a year, of which roughly half is considered to be prime farmland particularly suitable for cultivation.

Available evidence suggests that agricultural technology and resources—such as new crop varieties, irrigation, fertilizer, and energy—have limitations and cannot indefinitely compensate for farmland losses.

Governmental control of our Nation's land use traditionally rests at the state and local levels, but the federal government can be more supportive of efforts to preserve farmland,

especially prime farmland.

The United States Department of Agriculture has issued a policy on land use that directs the Department to make decisions and manage its land use-related programs to contribute to the Nation's short and long-range needs for protecting the natural environment; assuring adequate supplies of food, fiber, wood, and water; and providing for economic growth and development, energy and other facilities and services, and living space in our communities.

To implement this policy the Department will intercede in decision making by other Federal agencies where conversions of important farmlands are caused by an agency of the

federal government.

The California Senate Committee on Governmental Organizations claims it is a prime responsibility of state government to provide for comprehensive land use planning to avert leap-frogging urban development and ecological devastation

facing the United States.

Senator Garamendi proposed a bill where state agencies would have "the responsibility . . . to minimize the amount of land which is annually converted from agricultural to non-agricultural uses." The agencies also would have to "minimize the encroachment of industrial activities" in farm areas, "especially if such actions deprive croplands of needed water resources or produce pollutants which reduce crop yields." Under his bill, he said, the agencies and the governor would be required to make annual reports to the Legislature on acreage taken out of farm production "or adversely affected by their actions." Garamendi said the federal government is

taking action to reduce the impact of federal projects on crop acreage.

The most dominant force in land management is the free market. The tax assessor will assess agricultural land on the urban fringe which lead to higher, speculative uses. When this occurs, he then reassesses the agricultural land at this higher use regardless of the fact that the land in question is preserved under the Williamson Act. As a result, property tax assessment policies place inordinate pressures on landowners, especially farmers, to convert their soil to other uses because most land was assessed on its potential use.

Proposition 13 took all that fringe agricultural land that was taxed at its potential use and reverted it to its 1975 base. This dramatically reduced taxes collected by our cities. This impact has reduced the motivation for continued urban sprawl.

All segments of society have a role to play in managing California's land, federal, state, local and citizens. Federal government needs to be responsible for their actions in regards to its lands and actions as does State and local municipalities. Citizens need be responsible for the free market and limitations upon government.

In addition, inheritance taxes, both federal and state, place an onus on small farmers making it difficult for them to pass their land on to the next generation, since land is valued at the time of death on the basis of its development potential, according to its private, economic use. This tax policy encourages parceling farmland for urban purposes.

#### **ENERGY**

#### Coal

Have you ever wondered why coal-fired electrical generating stations have thousand-foot smoke stacks? The answer is simple and also frightening. Air quality at the coal-fired generating site must maintain a certain cleanliness; also they shoot the hot gases—the oxides of sulphur and nitrogen high into the atmosphere. Floating in the air these particles that are almost unseen combine in various ways with other gases, smoke and vapors to form among other pollutants sulfuric acid and nitric acid. Eventually they become part of the droplets of water vapors and fall to earth during a summer shower or a winter snow. A single shower of acid rain would have little effect but continued soaking overloads the ecosystem's natural buffers. Large areas of Canada and northeastern United States have lakes that are biologically dead and forests whose growth rate have seriously declined in the last 30 years.

No one really knows what the ultimate effects of acid precipitation might be on the complex chemical, biological and structural systems that make up the soil. The change will be slow, but this does not mean the alternation will not be significant. As soil acidifies, essential plant nutrients dissolve and leach away; other nutrients become excessive enough to become toxic; nitrogen-fixing bacteria are destroyed; earthworms are destroyed; and fungi which causes "stem rot" flourishes.

The scenairo is frightening and it is the desire of the California State Grange to protect the soils of this state that have given rise to over 200 varieties of fruits and vegetables that are essential to the consumers of this country. Alternatives to coal-fired power plants in California are being undertaken. Idaho, for instance, is constructing an on-site power plant to generate electrical power. Delegates to the California State Grange 108th convention may want to re-evaluate our policy toward coal-fired electrical generating stations in California.

#### Nuclear

The role nuclear power is to play in providing future energy for the United States is still a highly discussed topic. California State Grange has policy which stipulates that nuclear energy play a prominent role for *interim* energy supplies until alternative sources are cost efficient and come on line. Related to this policy is a real concern about the handling and disposal of nuclear waste. Not only does the Grange feel that the disposal of nuclear waste is the limiting factor to nuclear power development, but Congress has given considerable attention to the problem also.

The Carter administration nuclear waste management policy calls for expansion and diversification into geologic media other than salt. This shift has caused further delays in a commitment to begin construction of a particular site. Site selection under the President's plan is now scheduled for 1985 and the operational date has slipped to the mid 1990's. The President also decided to cancel the Waste Isolation Pilot Project located in New Mexico. Seen as the only viable near-term project, experts feel this is a serious setback. However, the Senate took action on the Nuclear Waste Policy Act which incorporates many of the elements of the Administration's policy but it also attempts to break the endless cycle of feasibility studies and mandates construction of a pilot project by 1988.

The nuclear waste issue is complex, controversial and suffers from overlapping jurisdictions. Congressional support is urgently needed to resolve the issue. We urge the delegates support early Congressional action which mandates prompt construction of a pilot project to dispose of nuclear waste.

#### **Alcohol Fuels**

It would seem that the energy crisis was solved if you listen to the proponents of alcohol fuel. Claims are being made that auto, trucks and planes can run on 100% alcohol fuel.

Not only that, neighborhood stills can be erected so you can be energy independent. However, all the evidence is not in and there is still much to be learned.

The Department of Agriculture feels quite certain that there are adequate surplus grain supplies and capacities which can be used to produce alcohol, without any disruption in the

food chain for people.

On the practical side there is reason for optimism and caution. The Department of Food and Agriculture has put out a list of sources of alcohol fuel plant equipment and supplies, but at the same time, the U.S.D.A. warns potential buyers, "as for packaged plants, any performance certification should be based upon at least a 60 consecutive-day test period in which all process inputs, outputs, and operating times are certified by an acceptable testing entity or recognized engineer."

Alcohol can be used straight if it is of the proper proof and a few changes are made to the consuming auto. Estimated cost of the home still variety is in the \$1.25 per gallon range. There is a whole list of precautions and safety tips put out by the U.S.D.A. It can be exciting in the 'forefront' of energy science and technology, and it also can be very frustrating and time-consuming. But farmers who take time to study and plan carefully are not wasting time.

New federal regulations on alcohol fuel production provide for the issuance of alcohol fuel plant licenses by the Treasury Department's Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Fire Arms that minimize the bonding requirements on the production and sale of fuel alcohol. This is in keeping with Conservation No. 10 adopted by the delegates at the 107th annual California State Grange session which resolved that the National Grange recommend a relaxing of National regulations that control development and utilization of any new fuel source.

In addition, federal financial incentives are now available for the construction of ethanol plants of up to 20% in tax credits. Also, an income tax credit of 40c per gallon for fuel alcohol greater than 190 proof and 30c per gallon for 150-190 proof alcohol is available until 1992 for ethanol produced and

used on farms.

#### **ELECTRIC POWER RATES**

One of the most important items in the farmers expense is the cost of electrical power where pumping for irrigation water is required. Information reaching our office indicates that in those areas where farmers are compelled to use some kind of energy to pump irrigation water, they can no longer meet the high rates charged by the electric power companies in California.

The present prices for agricultural commodities makes it virtually impossible for farmers to continue to pay the present high electrical rates, together with the accelerated stand-by charges for irrigation purposes. One farmer reported that the cost of pumping water with a 40-horsepower motor to irrigate 100 acres of permanent pasture was costing him \$2,300.00 a month.

To ease the excessive costs for pumping water for the production of food and fibre, it is recommended that the power companies institute incentives for farmers to convert their irrigation routine to pump water during off-peak power periods to take advantage of lower electrical rates.

#### **EXTENSION OF ELECTRICAL SERVICES**

The State Public Utilities Commission is considering eliminating the extension of all free footage allowances to new electric customers requiring line extensions. This applies to both rural and residential extensions. It has been the policy that free footage be adequate to fullfill growth requirements. but not so large as to burden existing customers.

The California Supreme Court in an early decision stated the rule in the extension service lines that has prevailed since time immemorial, "A utility must anticipate natural growth of the community and make gradual extensions to meet reasonable demands for service."

The impact of providing electric utility service in homes is less than in rural areas because most homes are all electric. usage and revenues per home are much higher than the system

average, and construction costs are generally less.

The impact of the proposed elimination of all electric line extension free allowances in rural areas are much greater. The effect on land values and land use planning will affect in time the property tax base in such areas. The abolition of free extension allowances is not needed in either the rural or in urban areas to promote and achieve conservation of energy.

Requiring the prospective new customer to pay the full capital costs of the utility for its power lines is contrary to the legal obligation which the utility has to render service and

meet reasonable growth to its service area.

We urge the Public Utilities Commission require the utility companies of California to meet their obligation and render electrical service to its customers and meet reasonable growth within their service territory.

#### COMMUNITY SERVICE PROGRAM

The National Grange is again sponsoring a Community Service Program with U.S. Savings Bonds as awards for State and National winners. For the first time in several years, California is eligible to participate in this program which is designed to encourage every Subordinate Grange to help provide the necessary leadership and initiative needed to inspire the community.

A good Community Service project will benefit your community and your Grange by highlighting Grange members

concern for others in the community.

All activities from September 1980 to 1981 can be claimed for your 1981 Community report next year, however, you must enter by June 30. Final reports must be mailed to the State Master's office by September 15, 1981.

State awards for 1980 are Savings Bonds in the amount of \$200.00, \$150.00, \$100.00 and \$75.00. National awards of \$1,000.00, \$500.00, \$300.00 and \$200.00 in Savings Bonds and a plaque. To qualify for participation in the 1981 program, a State must have not less than 10% of the Granges in the state enter the contest. Your entry again this year is important so this state may again qualify for the National awards.

#### MEMBERSHIP

An exerted effort must be made to reduce the loss of membership through suspensions for non-payment of dues and the misunderstandings which have occurred. Personal contact through the use of membership committees cooperating with the Secretary and Master of each Subordinate Grange should be appointed to accomplish the desired goal of a substantial reduction in membership losses. Closing this door will result in membership gains in California and insure our present position of being next to the number one position in the United States.

#### **DEPUTIES**

Without the assistance of the Deputies serving and helping this office and the Grange, it would be extremely difficult to serve our membership in an effective way. They have, as in the past, organized, conducted schools of instruction and workshops on a county-wide basis, and in some instances at the local Subordinate Grange level. They are here at this convention to assist in the sessions and to lend you a helping hand.

#### **WOMEN'S ACTIVITIES**

Again the Womens Activities of the California State Grange, under the able leadership of Joy Beatie, has made a major contribution to the welfare of the Granges throughout the State. They have not only spearheaded membership development and retention, but have moved forward with a wide field of activities.

Sister Joy Beatie, State Director of Womens Activities will present a detailed report today.

#### YOUTH

The California State Grange Youth Activities continue to stress the need for more participation by our young members in our Subordinate and Pomona Granges. The youth taking an active part in classes of our ritualism, workshops and speech training has prepared them to take an active part in the Grange at all levels. Brother Bill Booth, Director of Youth Activities, will report during this session.

#### JUNIOR GRANGE PROGRAM

The Junior Grange program is designed to provide a diversified program with contests and projects to stimulate interest and growth among its young members. This is really where our effort needs to be focused for future Grangers and

we should encourage this program to its fullest.

It is with regret that this program is not advancing as we would like. Only 13 Junior Granges out of 20 reported for the June 30, 1980 Quarterly Report to the National Grange. Seven of the twenty were delinquent. This compares with 23 Junior Granges one year ago with 9 of them delinquent. This is not a good record and a change in the administrative concept should be considered. It is recommended that this annual session authorize the Master to appoint a committee of five members with the chairman to serve as State Director to:

1. Formulate a program to be made available to all

Granges, encouraging the formation of a Junior Grange.

2. Develop an on-going training guide program to stimulate interest, to be disseminated to all Junior Granges, Matrons and Patrons.

3. Re-evaluate the program each two years.

#### **GRANGERS BUSINESS ORGANIZATION**

The Grangers Business Organization Incorporated provides substantial savings for many of our members in a wide variety of items, with heavy sales being in fencing and steel posts. During the year the Board of Directors elected to advertise in a centerfold in the California Grange News. This apparently has been a worthwhile effort to spread the cooperative benefits to more of our members. Continued efforts should be made to develop our cooperative to give better service for all our members. Manager Clarence Weisgerber will report to you during this session.

#### WORKER'S COMPENSATION INSURANCE

The Grange Worker's Compensation program, underwritten by the Truck Insurance Exchange of the Farmers Insurance Group, has shown a decline over the previous year's dividend paid to our members, due to higher claims for accidents among our participants.

We must continue our efforts to strive for an improved accident ratio, especially those requiring lengthy hospital and

medical attention, as well as recovery time.

#### **GRANGE INSURANCE ASSOCIATION**

Grange members in California have again benefitted through the Grange Insurance Association program of general, automotive, fire and extended insurance coverage. The continued increase in the number of policies written is an indication of acceptance by our membership.

The annual report will be given during this session by

James Burgess, Central California Director.

#### COMMERCIAL INSURANCE COMPANY

Brother Peter Marinoff continues to search for better programs to provide health and hospital protection for our members. The Commercial Hospital and Medical Insurance service program was instituted fifteen years ago and Brother Marinoff continues to strive to upgrade the service to help meet the high costs of hospital and medical service. He will report to you at this session.

#### BLUE SHIELD OF CALIFORNIA

Blue Shield continues to offer Grange members a valuable service in the face of spiraling hospital and medical costs which necessitated some rate increases. This program was instituted 34 years ago and is available to Grange members at the group rates.

#### **CREDIT UNION**

Deposits in Credit Unions in California represent a substantial portion of the financial structure of the lending institutions of this State. The Grange Credit Unions enjoy and share in the growth of the Credit Union movement by providing financial service for our members.

Time has been allocated during this session for a report by Sister Eunice Smith, Chairman of California Grange

Credit Union Committee.

#### IN MEMORIAM

The lengthening lines of those who participate in our annual Memorial Service confirms that many Grange homes

during the past year have lost a loved one.

On Thursday afternoon we will recess our session activities for a Memorial Service to honor those who have departed during the past year. We cherish the memory of our brothers and sisters who have rendered positive, able and fruitful service for our Order. These memories remain with us during our lifetime.

Sister Edna Cook, State Chaplain, has prepared an appropriate Memorial Service program which will be open to

the public.

#### CONCLUSION

In this address, I have made reference to some concerns facing our agricultural and urban society which you will want to consider and give your staff positive directions during the ensuing year. You are encouraged to discuss these important issues and resolutions with the respective committees during this session.

#### GOOD OF THE ORDER

The Budget

The 1980-81 budget, after consideration by the State Executive Committee, State Overseer, and this office, is an estimate of anticipated revenues and expenditures. It speaks for itself.

The major large increase over the 1979-80 budget is the increase in per capita tax dues of \$20,317.00 to the National Grange. The estimated annual dues to the National Grange are \$94,000.00. This additional expense, plus inflationary factors, made it necessary to reduce services to balance the budget. The Executive Committee elected to terminate the position of General Representative. This was a difficult decision since there is still a great need for more full-time promotional work in the field.

We all realize inflation is everywhere; your pocketbook, the Grange's pocketbook, and from all indications it will continue to grow. Oregon raised the per capita dues to \$8.00 two years ago; Washington raised to \$8.00 several years ago, and to \$10.00 beginning next January. We will do our utmost to maintain services with the present dues structure, but the day is near, with the present rate of inflation, when we must face realities and be braced for some raise in per capita dues.

#### California Grange News

The California Grange News is going through two major changes in operations; namely: (1) Addressing 33,000 copies per issue of the News and (2) Securing directory ads to support the paper. Both changes are the result of economics to publish your paper.

Of economic necessity, the obsolete addressograph system had to go . . . repair parts are no longer available except from other broken-down equipment. In addition, labor costs had to be trimmed. It was requiring 110 man hours to address each issue of the News. The option was going to the computer system which has already reduced the addressing time to 36 hours. Since Grange membership by Granges is also on the magnetic tape, many hours per month to maintain a  $3 \times 5$  card membership system are being saved in office time.

The cost of solicitation of advertising for the directory ads by sales people in the field on a commission basis is no longer economic, due to the high cost of travel. As a result. we mailed a letter to all Subordinate Grange Masters in April. 1980, offering the Grange the normal commission allowed salespersons to secure ads. This has not been a success story, although a few Granges have participated and have received commissions. We must remember the life blood of any newspaper is in its advertising. The Grange News is no exception, and this program must work in order to maintain a 16 page edition of the News. And, that decision rests with each and every Subordinate and Pomona Grange in our State. Any weaknesses that we may have at the local level, if widespread, will manifest themselves as a State problem. And obviously, improving the Grange News, which is our goal, greater financial support must come either through increased advertising or by increasing the dues to support the paper. The latter is not desirable, nor is it necessary, but Subordinate Granges need to respond, and do so soon.

#### The Grange Structure

The Grange structure is ideally suited through its committee system to provide an opportunity for its members to participate as a working team, to work together, to influence others, and to improve conditions in its community. This opportunity begins with the leadership and with each individual Subordinate Grange member.

Too many Granges are not availing themselves of the made-to-order system which manifests itself in the Grange fabric. Our goal this coming year must be to encourage Grange leadership and Grange membership to use the built-in design

for a more successful organization.

The administrative staff at your headquarters, which includes your State Secretary, deserves a word of praise for their loyalty and for carrying forward the many details of work which includes updating our accounting and reporting system. Their personal interest in their work makes for a smooth running efficient organization. This also includes the efforts of your State Lecturer, State Treasurer, State Director of Women's Activities, State Youth Director, State Director of Junior Granges and your State Director of Membership.

After Pfanner & Neves departed it was voted that the California State Grange retain the services of Pfanner & Tate Accountancy Corporation to establish and maintain a General Ledger, provide monthly unaudited Financial Statements, and prepare all Federal and State payroll and tax reports, at an estimated cost of between \$450.00 and \$550.00 per month, effective January 1, 1980, and that the position of bookkeeper be eliminated and the services of the employee be terminated allowing two weeks severance pay, plus accumulated vacation pay.

The State Master discussed resolution G-20 which requests the establishment of a Grange Publicity Builders Fund. It was agreed to research the formation of the Doris Deaver Memorial Fund, together with correspondence relating thereto, to determine whether the original goal as envisioned by the sponsors had been reached, to ascertain if the Doris Deaver Memorial Fund could be terminated and all future memorials and donations be allocated to the Grange Publicity Builders Fund.

The Deputy Conference was discussed and State Master Koster indicated that he would, along with Brother Welty and Brother Austin, prepare an agenda for the January 19-20, 1980 conference, based on active participation by the deputies.

After detail review of the galley sheet of the proposed Constitution & By-Laws, it was voted that 2,000 copies be printed for distribution, with one copy going to each Subordinate and Pomona Grange, and that the cover be light green or blue.

After review and discussion, it was voted that the Master be authorized to appoint David Austin, General Deputy, as the Membership Director.

It was *voted* that the Grange continue its support of the Junior Grand National Livestock Exposition annual award.

# **GENERAL DEPUTY — 1980**

As people's lifestyles change daily I experienced a change in my lifestyle last November. Many of you remember at last year's session I accepted a part time position representing the California State Grange. Little did I know that soon thereafter the opportunity of working full time would materialize. After family consultations and business consultations, I said YES. Employing the position of General Deputy for the California State Grange is a unique experience. (Your elected Overseer being paid to oversee). This last  $11\frac{1}{2}$  months has put me on the road about 181 days, averaging three meetings per week, many Grange meetings and events and many non-Grange events putting my public relations abilities to test representing you and the California State Grange.

To highlight a few speaking experiences: Lions Breakfast Club, Kiwanis Breakfast, Council of California Growers, Federal Users Advisory Board Hearing (gave CSG testimony regarding Ag. Mechanization and Research), about forty minutes with an Ag. Policy class at Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo, CSG representative for the Producer Organization Caucus for the National Cotton Council and the U.S.D.A., State Grange Youth Easter Conference, and the CSG Young Marrieds and Singles Conference. (Was most elated when the Dean of Agriculture and the Co-ordinator of the Educational Department at Cal Poly approached me after my presentation at the Youth Easter Conference Banquet and asked me if I could give a similar presentation at their next Vo-Ag seminar for all the Vo-Ag teachers in the State).

All I did was tell them what it is like to join the Grange at the age of 12 and participate in the Junior Grange, Youth Grange, Young Marireds/Singles, Subordinate and Pomona Master, Deputy, State Grange Executive Committee, General Deputy and Overseer. I guess it didn't hurt to mention to them I had four years of Vo-Ag, Future Farmers of America leadership training and one year at Cal Poly.

After attending more than 100 Grange meetings and functions this last year and recording my experience on a Field Evaluation Report, "taking a pulse reading of our Granges" if you will, is giving your state Grange headquarters a renewed direction for its leadership abilities and a feedback mechanism to your State Executive Committee for its decision making process.

This is giving us an added insight as to where we are and where we are going. This in addition to our "Where Did We Fail?" questionnaire and the "New Member Plan" as mentioned in the membership report has given us a stronger position to address our leadership training (or lack of training) to develop and pin-point this training to a constructive cnd. A case in point is our Deputy force: We have found that

all good things, programs, ideas, research and inner workings within our State office rarely go beyond its front doors. We hope to close this gap by supplying our Deputy force (your communication link with the State Headquarters) with information before it is printed in the Grange News newspaper and into the homes of 35,000 families.

We hope to apply a similar approach (or a program) designed to amplify the need for being an active member on the county level—the Pomona Grange.

This we feel can best be accomplished by providing a training program on the local Grange level that will enhance alternatives to our present Grange structure allowing our present members and our new members the opportunity to develop their talents and to participate in their local Grange leadership, social and educational activities. A training program citing alternatives for our current leaders to address the 70-90% of our membership who do not participate currently.

As we represent possibly the last Grass-roots organization on the horizon we must recognize the fact that our membership is composed of mixed ethnics, creeds, and cultural backgrounds with all age levels tossed in. We also should keep in mind that most people within our membership could be catagorized into three groups: 1) Joiners (they join for the sake of joining; 2) Benefit members (those insurance members we call them but, remember there is credit union, medical, scholarships—what about those who benefit from just participating and 3) active, participating members, or a combination of catagories 1 and 2.

If we were not to worry about the 90% that stays home and concentrate on having a few strong programs such as Womens Activities, Youth, Group Benefits, Legislation, Leadership or anything your Grange chooses to do (as long at it is not illegal or immoral) and attract just 5 to 10% to each program, you could easily address 40 to 50% of your membership. (You probably already are). We must realize that our needs, goals and lifestyles change daily. Before we have negative thoughts about our 90% who stay home we should think what would happen if they all showed up at our Grange meeting at once. What would happen if just 50% of your Grange members showed up at one time. Is our coffee pot large enough, do we have enough chairs, and also we better check our restroom facilities. Would it make a difference if our dormant 90% were informed on what we are doing on our local Grange level? An alternative would be that they get a newsletter, a postcard or a phone call—the only other communication they get is through the Grange News newspaper.

An alternative for the 90% of our members who stay home — if they just knew-as-a-fact that their Grange meeting would start on the minute and end at a specified time — knowing what to expect before they left home — might that make

Your membership department took on a new dimension this year. A dimension that enabled it to offer to its members enovative and constructive membership building programs for its future.

A brief quote from our Grange Initiate and Declaration of Purposes, and I quote "Grange work is built upon universal service, with sufficient range in its activities to give each member of the Grange—each member of the family—definite tasks. You have individual talents. Through the Grange you are offered the priviledge of using these to the benefit of your Brothers and Sisters in the Grange and your fellow citizens in the community. That Grange is strongest in which ALL the members bear some responsibility, no matter how willing a few may be to accept it all" end of quote.

To date we have received over 25% of these questionnaires revealing to us some very useful data relating directly to our "back-door" losses. Also we have some startling facts unveiled to us. I am going to read to you the questionnaire and provide you with some percentage figures.

Yes, many have indicated: No. 1—a need to know more about our benefits and services (which we hope to address in the short future by providing a short story from each affiliate, to be printed in our Grange News newspaper, that you can clip out and save for future reference when talking to your friends and neighbors), No. 2—not too many people feel we have a problem with our ritual (if it is done right), No. 3—1 out of 10 members in your Grange possibly have a wrong mailing address; No. 4—the majority were notified (by some means—phone call, post card or letter) that their dues were delinquent and, No. 5—about half told me that it was personal (none of my business) but, only 6 did NOT make a comment.

The most startling facts revealed were: No. 1—only 7 of 147 people were contacted IN PERSON before being dropped; No. 2—16% said there was just a misunderstanding (they either paid their dues or it was a bookkeeping error; No. 3—and get ready for this — almost 50% listed their name and address for reinstatement; No. 4—47% wanted to know more about a specific service or benefit; 1% moved out of state leaving a forwarding address (we have sent their name and address to other state Granges, if they have one, asking them to drop them a line). All of the questionnairse asking for reinstatement, services and benefits, and out-of-state members are in the process of getting follow-up letters addressing their specific request or reinstatement procedures. If we could retain just 35% to 45% of our reinstatement potential we would show an annual net gain.

Another constructive membership builder — a NEW MEMBER PLAN — adopted by your State Executive Committee, presented at your 1980 Deputies Conference, a sample with instructions were mailed in early April to each Master, Lecturer and Membership Chairman in each Subordinate

Grange — a plan called "Welcome to the Grange".

Since we have never offered any sales training, per se, for selling the Grange (door to door) to our neighbors, friends and relatives then we should not expect you or the members you represent to knock on your neighbors door and be asked the ultimate question, "what is the Grange?" The "Welcome to the Grange" program is to be explained and adopted by your Grange, or a committee, and reads like this: Explain overview:

## **NEW MEMBER PLAN - OUTLINE**

1. At your Grange meeting, Lecturer program, Good of the Order, New Business, Potluck or a Special Meeting called together just for explaining this program — ask each member present to write a name and address of a prospective member's name on a piece of paper. Also they should include their own name as they will be host to their guest as will be indicated on the invitation. (Have youngsters participate also).

2. Notify the State Grange membership Dept. regarding

HOW MANY names only.

3. We will send to you, at no charge, an equal number of "Welcome Packets, Invitations and Envelopes".

4. At the time of obtaining your names establish a program. A program that will be of interest to everyone in your audience. (Not the same as a Booster night).

5. Establish a "follow-up" committee. A telephone committee. You are going to give your new prospective members a follow-up call later.

6. Fill in the blanks on the invitation (time, date, place)

Address and Mail.

7. Present your 20 minute program.

3. Distribute "Welcome Packets" to your guests. (A Junior

packet for the children is in the making).

 Master of Ceremonies, or a designated person, read the fact sheet as the guests follow. (Explain contents of packet).

10. Refreshment Time.

 Follow-up telephone call a week to ten days after the program and ask them what they think about the Grange.

As there is a significant cost to this program we are asking you to have your Grange adopt this program and provide the necessary signature and Seal when requesting these materials.

Now if you are interested in numbers the potential of this program is awesome. Consider our 316 Subordinate Granges and 47,000 members. This, with few exceptions, would average approximately 150 members per Grange. If just 10% were to be participating members this would be 15 people. (Not too far off is it?) By using these conservative figures, which each Grange has the potential of doing, then double 15 four times (15, 30, 60, 120, 240-15 equals) or once each quarter, and you would put the Grange story and the opportunity of joining the Grange into the hands of 225 people. Sounds like a dream doesn't it? Knowing that 100% success of this figure would be over 70,000 new members for our California State Grange plus the 47,000 we already have (117,000 in one year) would be a little far fetched. But, a figure like 10% or 7,800 to 10,000 annually is attainable. If this is not constructive programming — then we are listening.

As our membership recognition awards will be presented later in our session schedule, we the California State Grange and the Membership Department, extends our gratitude for your success' last year and lend you our support for a constructive and fruitful year ahead.

Yes, the National Grange is interested in our innovative programs as a constructive means for aiding and supporting membership in many of the lessor states. We can be proud to share our ideas with the National Grange as our success depends vitality on their success.

### **WOMEN'S ACTIVITIES REPORT --- 1980**

Worthy Master, Distinguished Guests, State Officers, Brothers and Sisters:

The National Grange Theme for 1980 was Grange Women are "Shaping Tomorrow's Legacy Today" by being involved in National and State Programs.

We have the National Health Deaf program and 100 Grange CWA's in California, contributed a total of \$772.25 to this fund. We have available for sale, Sign Language Song Books and Playing Cards for \$2.00 each. The Silent Sirens are still available for 25c each. Many CWA's have purchased these Sirens and given them to Emergency officers in their area, such as Firemen, Policemen, Hospital personnel, etc. Some CWA's had special projects with the money from these projects going to the fund "Dogs for the Deaf". CWA's are still saving the Hearing Aid Batteries that are sold and the money used for Deaf work in California. Batteries sold this year amounted to \$785.00. At the last Convention \$1200.00 was given to the State Grange Deaf Committee, from the sale of Hearing Aid Batteries. Some Grange members are attending Sign Language classes throughout California.

VOSH, Volunteer Optometric Service to Humanity is still a National Project and we have sent approximately 1800 pair of used eye glasses to this project. These glasses are prepared and labeled so as to identify the lens prescription and are prescribed by members of VOSH to needy people around the world.

The Recognition Notebooks sent in this year for the Seal of Merit were more this year. The Notebooks winners for Pomona were Peggy Striffler, San Diego County: 1st place. Marjorie Lindbeck, Stanislaus - Tuolumne County Pomona: 2nd place. Mary Victorine, Siskiyou County Pomona, 3rd place. In the Subordinate judging, Thelma Meyer, Millville Grange No. 443, 1st place. Arabelle Saunders, Ramona Grange No. 632, 2nd place. Helen Papst, Orangevale Grange No. 354, 3rd place. The cash prizes given to these women will be \$25.00 1st place, \$15.00, 2nd place, and \$10.00 3rd place. The rules to earn your Seal of Merit for 1981 has been changed. We hope this will create more interest with the chairmen. At National level for 1979, Peggy Striffler, San Diego County won 1st and Thelma Meyer, Millville Grange won 6th.

The National Grange Care project was for continued program of Irrigation Systems in Peru. This year 155 Granges contributed \$1,193.00 toward this project.

We still have Meals for Millions, as a State Project and this year Granges in California contributed \$2,176.00.

221 pounds of Cancelled Stamps were given to the Sons of Norway, who ship these stamps to Tubfin, Norway, where they are Processed and packaged and sold to collectors around the world. The money raised from the sale of these stamps is used for Norwegian children with Respiratory and Genetic diseases.

With the help of all members and non-members we met our goal of 4,000 sewing entries for the National Grange Sewing Contest. A total of 4,252 entries were sent in. At National Judging Marjorie Lindbeck, Waterford Grange, received Honorable mention for her entry in Class C.

We received word from the National Director, Mary Buffington, that the dates of the 1981 Sewing Contest have been changed to December 1, 1980 through April 15, 1981. This should enable us to get our judging and pictures complet-

ed in plenty of time for National Judging in June.

The National Grange Needlework Contest, Sponsored by Coats & Clark, have many entries now, the Judging will not be completed in time for this report. In the 1979 Contest we had two 2nd place National Winners: Thelma Buhler, Prunedale Grange with a crocheted tablecloth and Arlee Frazee, Oakdale

Grange with Embroidered Pillow Cases.

In the National Grange Stuffed Toy Contest we don't seem to have as many entries as usual. This is a splendid opportunity for Community Service as all toys go to Children's Hospitals and Homes. In 1979 we had a 2nd place winner using a McCall's Pattern, Emmy Petch of Millville Grange. Also Emmy received Honorable Mention in the Fairfield Poly-fil Judging. She received a \$50.00 U.S. Savings Bond from McCalls.

Our tating contest created a lot of interest and we had

continued it for this year with many entries sent in.

We also had other State Contests this year such as Quilt, Food Preservation as well as the Cookie and Candy Contests. The Quilt Contest was sponsored by Peter Marinoff and Fairfield Processing Company, with Cash prizes and Fairfield merchandise for Group quilts and individual quilts.

The Food Preservation contest is being sponsored by Ball Corporation and Holly Sugar. Judging for these contests will be on Tuesday p.m. the same time as the Cookie and Candy

contests are judged.

The New Cookbooks "California Granger's Delight" are now available and if you wish you may get some for your Grange in the CWA room. These cost you \$4.00 per book by

the box, and they sell for \$5.00.

Leave your Bluebird packages in the CWA room and be sure to get a ticket in exchange. The Women's Breakfast will be in the Arlington Room on Plaza level. The tickets are limited so purchase yours early. The price is \$4.50.

The Women's March money this year is to go for two \$500.00 scholarships to Grange members enrolled in college.

The remainder will go to the Dogs for the Deaf.

Many Granges report they have held fund raising for many worthy projects and many do not report these activities. Be sure and let us know what you are doing throughout California.

The Ocean Spray Cranberry Recipe Contest was entered by approximately 35 Granges sending in recipes. We did not

have any winners in California.

For the first time the retiring Regional CWA Directors were honored on Sunday night. They have served many faithful years and will be missed. Those retiring as of November 1, 1980 are Region 2, Nadine Davis; Region 3, Velma Sutliff; Region 7, Edith Kaiser. They will be replaced by: Region 2, Junia Niesen; Region 3, Dorothy Abels; Region 7, Elsie Espinola. Thanks loads ladies.

Also honored was Hortense Freeman, Region 10, who resigned in 1978, because of illness. Mary Jamerson was appointed for Region 10 in 1979. Barbara Moberg was appointed to fill the vacancy in Region 6 in 1979, after Reba Fredrickson resigned.

Thanks to all Grangers for their encouragement and as-

sistance during the past year.

# DIRECTOR OF YOUTH ACTIVITIES REPORT — 1980

Worthy Master, Worthy State Officers, Delegates, Honored Guests and Brothers and Sisters:

One year ago, I was asked a question which took much thought and consideration before I said YES. One year ago, the Worthy State Master asked if I would consent to being the State Director of Youth Activities. In the year that has passed, I have learned a lot about myself, and the Grange. What has happened in this year previous is now history. And that is why I am here now reporting to you.

The first task was the Youth Coordinating Council meeting. This is a meeting of the Youth Officers from both the Teen and Young Married and Singles section and the Outstanding Young Grangers and Young Couple. This meeting was held in the State Grange Office during the Deputies Conference in January of this year. This was an important meeting because it was to set the tempo for the coming year.

At this meeting we analyzed the Youth Handbook, every line, word, and punctuation mark. We corrected the grammar, rearranged parts into a more meaningful order and, in general, made the handbook easier to read and to understand. It was at this meeting that we developed the new guidelines for the Outstanding Young Granger and Young Couple Contests, which are in use at this convention. Never before had there been such a set of guidelines that controlled the qualification of the candidates, how they were to be tested and on what they were to be tested. These standards also include minimum scores for different sections of the contest and for the entire final total. Now, unless a candidate can score above 50% in any single section or 75% for the final combined score, they will not be allowed to be considered for the final selection. So we now have a contest where it is possible not to have any winners, but that is only fair when you consider that the person who wins will be the actual Outstanding Young Granger.

A building won't stand long unless it is supported by a strong foundation. Our foundation is the Regional Directors of California. They support the framework of our program and provide the basis for building a strong program. Following the Coordinating Council meeting, we conducted the Regional Directors meeting, which was also held in the Sacramento Office. It was here that the blueprints for the coming year were made. It was there that individual assignments for the different camps and conferences were made. At this meeting we also reviewed the decisions of the Coordinating Council and discussed any possible further revisions. It was at this meeting that we introduced the new Region Nine Youth Director, Darlene Wingfield.

The Young Married and Singles Section, under the able direction and leadership of Randy and Linda Lewis, conducted

their annual conference during the Washington Birthday Weekend in the Yucca Grange Hall in Los Angeles County. We were honored to have as our special guest Pat and Arden Fitch, the National Grange Young Couple. The conference was a great success again this year, with over 50 Grangers in attendance. This was great considering we had one of the rainiest weekends in many years. The new officers for coming year were elected. They are Linda Lewis, chairman; Sue Squire, Vice Chairman, with their husbands as their secretaries.

San Luis Obispo was the site of the annual Easter Youth Conference more commonly referred to as Cal Poly. Again, as in the past, this year's conference can be called a success. With over ninety Grangers in attendance and a well-planned program for the four day meet, a lot of new young Grangers were given a meaningful introduction to Grange. Again this year we received an outstanding helping hand from the California Polytechnic State University in providing speakers and facilities for our opening night formal banquet and also tours of the Poultry and Ornamental Horticulture Units. This is a conference that no Grange Youth or Adult should ever miss. A four day program that provides a true Granger experience, in learning about Grange, in learning about agriculture, and in learning about other Grangers.

It was at this conference that the Teen Section elected their new officers for the coming year. Corey Clouse was elected Chairman and you will hear a few words from him during Youth Night. Breck Austin is the new Vice Chairman, Vicky Roots the new Treasurer and Heidi Brooke is doing an excellent job as the Sections' Secretary. Easter Conference is also the site of the annual Speech Contest for the Grange Youth. This year the winners were Betsy Geissler and Heidi Brooke. The Speech contest was very ably conducted by Suzi Doerksen who has won numerous speech contests in the past.

Buck's Lake in Plumas County was the site of this year's State Grange Camp. Grange Camp is open to all Grange members and it is conducted by the State Grange Youth Department. With just a few short of one hundred, this camp was one of the largest ever. Our special guest, Kristy Wilson, National Grange Princess, made the camp a delightful place to be.

Camp is a family experience. There are activities for all interested Grange members. Camp is a balance of work, learning more about Grange, Fellowship, learning more about Grangers, and Fun. Where else can you go for five days and four nights, have lodging and meals provided for \$30.00. Camp Pinecrest on the beautiful central coast of San Luis Obispo County near Cambria, will be the location of the 1981 camp. The dates will be the 15th to the 19th of August. You are all invited to attend.

The only other activity that I will talk about is the Western States Youth Leadership Conference. Held in McMinnville, Oregon this year, and attended by over 15 California Grangers, it was reported as being a success again this year. This is a unique conference by the fact that each year its location is changed among the eight western states, and it is directed as a joint effort of the National Grange and the hosting state's Youth Department. The primary goal of this conference is to develop better leadership skills in our younger Grange members, and to provide a medium for the exchange of ideas between the youth of the Western States. This conference is the site of the Regional Finals for the speech contest and I am happy to report that California, through the fine efforts of Betsy Geissler and Heidi Brooke won their speech classes at this competition.

In California, we use various National Grange programs. Among the most popular is the Outstanding Young Granger Contest. This year we have three entries and I feel that each of them would be an excellent representative of our state. I am sad to report that again this year we do not have any entries in the Outstanding Young Couple Contest, or in the Grange Inter-State Youth Exchange Program. These two are very worthwhile programs that I will be concentrating on in the coming year. Another program that proved to be under utilized, is the Youth Representative Award program. This year we only had one entry and it was judged a winner none-the-less. That entry was from Gary Daley of Wyandotte Grange. Some special plans are being made to encourage participation in this worthwhile program.

I have spent a lot of time talking about different programs of the Youth Department but now I would like to mention the subject of finances. We have had a long tradition in the Youth Committee as being self-supporting in the funding of our programs. This means that all of our monies comes from donations, not the dues per capita taxes. We would like to keep it this way if possible. The only way that we can will be with your help. Please support the youth projects. Ask your Grange to make a small donation to the State Youth Department, each year. With your help we can continue to provide a very cost effective program to the Youth of the Granges of California.

I would like to invite you all to the Youth Breakfast

tomorrow morning starting at 6:30 a.m.

As I close, I want to say a few special thank yous. I want to thank the State Grange Master, Brother Koster for his cooperation as I have been learning the job of Youth Director this past year. I want to thank the Regional Directors for their excellent cooperation and support. But most of all, I want to thank the Youth for their participation in the programs we have sponsored this past year. You have made it all the success that it really is. But I must make a very special thank

you to my wife Lillian, for all her support and help this past year. She has made the task much easier.

I would also like to invite you all to our Youth Night Activities Program tonight starting at 8:00 p.m. sharp.

Last year at this time we had 23 Junior Granges, this year we only have 20. Of the 20 only 9 are active. They are terrific but why can't we have more? This past year, in February, Lake County Deputy Master Dan Lenton organized Konocti Junior Grange No. 207. Congratulations Dan! Hopefully, at the next Deputies confer-

ence, the situation will look better.

I am receiving some outstanding quarterly reports. I am real proud of our Juniors in their great work. I am most happy to learn that several Juniors and Youth are working together. Others report that the Juniors keep the grounds of the Grange Hall free from weeds and litter. They have antilitter projects where they clean highways and roads. The money they receive from the sale of cans has been donated to the Dogs for the Deaf program and one Junior Grange purchased a flag for their Subordinate Grange. Disco dances are held, one especially, has one on Halloween to keep the children off the streets and introduce them to the Junior Grange program. The proceeds from these Discos also goes to the Dogs for the Deaf.

A Matron made two afghans and raffled them off. The proceeds paid the expenses for the Juniors to come to the

convention and to go to Grange Camp.

Picnics, campouts, swimming parties, skating parties, pizza parties, are just a few things that are held to promote Junior Grange and introduce themselves to others.

Many assisted the Subordinates and Pomona Lecturers

during the year with various programs.

Toys and food for the needy were collected and turned over to Protect Toy Lift and distributed throughout the country.

A Junior Matron reports her Juniors had a first and two second place winners on the county level in the sewing contest.

Help was given by selling tickets for a raffle and helping with a dinner for scholarships given by a Subordinate Grange. Two \$400.00 scholarships were given.

Help was given the Youth of a church in cleaning yards and helping invalids and widows.

Some Juniors worked with the District Deputy Master in assisting with his installing team throughout the area.

Articles of activities were sent to the newspaper by a Junior Grange giving them publicity and keeping the community informed of such activities as fair booths, individual displays, animals, a float in the Fourth of July parade and a Drill Team that took a first place award.

One Junior Grange had an open meeting and honored the Past and Present Masters of the Pomona and Subordinate Granges in the County. At one Pomona meeting and one Subordinate meeting they seated the Officers of the Grange.

Each Subordinate Grange be encouraged to have an active Junior committee and invite the Junior Grange to present a Lecturer's Program some time during the year when pos-

sible

Junior Grange Honorary Membership Fee—The minimum

membership fee shall not be less than one dollar.

# REPORT OF THE LEGISLATIVE DIRECTOR

Worthy National Officers, State Master, Officers, Delegates, Brothers and Sisters of the California State Grange:

The California State Grange legislative department has provided its membership a greater range and more thorough representation this year than in the past. This is made possible by an increased participation of the membership through the interim committee structure.

Let me recount to you some of the accomplishments of this year.

- 1. The year began with a tremendous opportunity as Secretary Bergland of the USDA slated a series of hearings on the structure of Agriculture. The Grange was quick to respond and was given the prestigious position of being seated on the first panel which highlighted the hearing. Full advantage was taken of the time to speak to the secretary in a public forum as the statement outlined seven major points of concern to the Grange.
- 2. A statement was given on behalf of the membership of the California State Grange before the Sub-committee on Water and Power Resources of the U. S. House of Representatives clarifying the Granges' position on Reclamation Reform.

The long and proud history of the Grange's support of the Reclamation Act in addition to our current policy position was outlined for the Sub-committee. Through it all the one theme stood out: Grangers demanding an equitable distribution of wealth attributed to Reclamation water. In addition many letters were sent to Washington specifying the California State Grange position on the different reclamation bills. The California State Garnge also called on the National Grange for support and direct lobbying efforts.

3. The California State Grange became totally involved in the effort to utilize the New Melones Dam and we were successful. From the beginning our membership indicated a strong desire to rectify the situation. An intense battle ensued in Washington to add the Stanislaus River to the National Wild and Scenic Rivers Act, thus to nulify the water holding ability of the New Melones Dam. Through a determined effort the Stanislaus River was stricken from the bill clearing the way to fill the Reservoir this spring.

4. Grange members went a long way to help themselves by writing in support of reasonable regulations to govern the use of pesticides in California. Without the great response of Grange members, the Agricultural industry may have been saddled with regulations heavily influenced by environmentalists. We now have regulations that although not perfect are tolerable.

5. The California State Grange came to the aid of a local Grange in an effort to halt the federal government from increasing its involvement in an attempt to preserve Big Sur. The California State Grange joined the Big Sur Coalition and to this point have been successful in attaining a Joint Resolution from California supporting local control, thus stalling movement of all federal legislation to the contrary.

6. The California State Grange became intensely involved in a groundwater management bill out of Sierra and Long valleys of California after being alerted by concerned Grange members from the area. The Grange worked closely with the author of the bill SB 1391 and successfully removed all objections. This may prove to be a model for the rest of the state.

7. The California State Grange has been called on to participate in the revamping of Cal-Expo. Your Master, Edwin Koster, has been appointed to the Advisory Committee of Cal-Expo. Testimony was also given earlier this year to support a move to place the operations of Cal-Expo into the hands of an independent Board of Directors to be appointed by the Governor and responsible to the legislature.

8. Perhaps the biggest victory for Agriculture and the Grange was the Senate's vote not to confirm Gerald Brown's reappointment to the Agriculture Labor Relations Board. Gerald Brown as chairman was clearly biased and nearly always sided with the Unions in their dealings with farmers.

The Grange will continue to work hard to attain an objective board to carry out the intent of the Agricultural Labor Relations Act.

- 9. The Grange in its continued review of management plans for California's Wild and Scenic Rivers is particularly concerned about Governor Brown's request to place California rivers into the Federal Wild and Scenic Rivers Act. Policy to be determined at this convention will dictate our next move.
- 10. The California State Grange is proposing "Right to Farm Legislation" that will protect farmers from nuisance suits brought to bear from recent residents to the country or urban fringe.

These are the main highlights of this year's work. Other areas that were attended to include: Double taxation on gasoline, Synthetic Fuels Act, Inheritance tax, Resource Conservation Act, Dairy price supports, Cooperative, Peripheral Canal, Agricultural mechanization, Fuels allocation and others.

The office of Legislative Director is also responsible for the continued communication to keep Grangers informed of the activities of the State Office. The main means to accomplish this are articles in the Grange News and the Grange Action Newsletter sent to all Granges throughout the state.

#### **GRANGE NEWS REPORT**

Worthy Master, Honored Guests, Brothers and Sisters of the California State Grange:

For those of you following the printed program, I'll point out that I'm not Gary Doud but Jay Hartz. Gary and I are often confused with one another. Even after three years Mary Wendt has a difficult time telling us apart. But like I keep telling her, it's easy . . . I'm the skinny one.

I'm the editor of your Grange News, the mysterious "I" and "we" that crops up now and then in the pages of C.G.N.

My job is to separate the wheat from the chaff . . . and then make sure that the chaff gets printed.

It's a good job, and 1980 has been a good year. Some exciting things have been happening, and I'd like to tell you about a couple of them.

The Grange has long been aware of the value of public relations. This year saw the emergence of the Grange Publicity Builders Committee which is taking steps to publicize the Grange from the state level.

A program has also been devised, that in effect, allows us to reach the influential business community from a local level. That is the Grange News Directory Program. Like so many good ideas, this one started out as something else. We were looking for economic help for the news and the State Office was looking to help local Granges. It was decided to give the commission and responsibility for directory sales to Subordinate Granges.

It was only after the program was initiated that the full impact of the opportunity it presened came to be appreciated.

While local Granges can make money selling directory

ads, it will never be a primary source of income.

But while we won't GET rich, the program gives us a means to ENrich our local Grange by publicizing our activities to one of the most influential groups of any community . . . the local businessman.

How does it work? Here's one way.

First, decide on a specific program or project that the proceeds from directory ad sales will go toward . . . perhaps

scholarships or high school band uniforms.

Now have one or two of your members approach local merchants starting with the ones that they already do business with. Explain your project to the merchant. Tell him that the commission you receive from the sale of ads will go to support that project. Let him know that you intend to keep him informed on the progress you are making, and that he will be an honored and welcome guest at any presentation ceremonies.

Now, what have we just done?

Even if the merchant does not buy an ad, we have accomplished a prime objective . . . we have spread the word that there is an active Grange in our community. A Grange that is busy promoting community welfare and services.

Now businessmen gossip just like anyone else. You couldn't buy enough newspaper space to get the P-R value of a conversation over coffee that starts out, "Did those people

from the Grange come into your place today?"

Now if he buys an ad, we're really cookin'.

There are all of the previously mentioned advantages, plus the opportunity to keep that merchant involved. He is now a Grange Supporter. He should be invited to your socials, and by all means fulfill your promise to keep him informed and up to date on the project about which you originally approached him. Solicit his advice and support on community issues. Keep him aware of the Grange!

His subscription to the Grange News will keep him informed of the Grange position on State and National issues, as well as up to date on benefit and group programs as they are

developed and implemented.

He will become a part of every P-R mans dream . . . an informed public. And I can think of no better prospect for membership than one who is already familiar with the activities and philosophy of the Grange.

And let's not forget that support begets support. By encouraging our members to shop the merchants who advertise in the Directory, we can insure their support of our Grange and its activities.

As Master Koster stated in his address on Tuesday, the program has had little response this past year. Perhaps that is because it is not fully understood. We will try and correct that. In the meantime I hope you can see the advantages beyond the economic support it lends the News. Properly used, we all win through a stronger, well publicized Grange.

Another program that you are probably aware of is that the California State Grange has gone "computer". Some of you, I know, are a little more aware than others. Particularly if you were one of those that received 6 copies of the same issue, or were dropped from the mailing list for no apparent

reason.

I'm sure some of you are convinced that computerization has simply given us a more efficient means of screwing things

up.

Things are improving, however. I checked with the data processing people just before I left and they tell me that the issue that was mailed last Friday should have most of the bugs worked out. Changes of address and corrections, I am told, are current. And the corrected reports sent in by secretaries had been processed for all but three Granges.

Now we can begin to see the advantages of computeriza-

tion.

Before switching to computer, addressing your Grange News took approximately 100 man-hours. Today it takes 30.

Under the old system, a change of address operation took 6½ minutes and consisted of 8 separate operations, all of which had to be done by hand. Today, it takes less than 60 seconds, with the whole operation being keypunched but once.

And this just scratches the surface when it comes to bene-

fits that computerization will provide us with.

In the past, there were two lists that had to be maintained: a membership list on all members of the Grange, and a mailing list maintained by the Grange News for head of households and subscriptions. Maintenance of these lists required two people who devoted about 75% of their time strictly to list maintenance. Given an average salary of \$10,000 per year, then the cost just to maintain the files was about \$15,000 . . . \$7,500 from the State Grange and \$7,500 from the Grange News.

With data processing one list is kept for both operations. The cost is shared. It costs the State Grange and the Grange News about \$2,500.00 each a year . . . or an annual savings of

about \$10,000.00.

Before data processing, secretaries and membership committees had to maintain a membership list for per-capita dues and other records.

Today, a membership list will be provided each Grange, free of charge, in the form of a computer readout. Secretaries

will simply enter corrections as needed.

Before when a new member joined, it took a quarterly report to open a line of communication between that new member and the State Office. Now secretaries can mail in additions or changes as they happen, and within weeks a line of communication has been established from the State, including a subscription to the Grange News.

In the future, the State will be able to provide Subordinate Granges with lists of who in their Grange are eligible for

length of service awards, kept track of automatically.

The State can provide Subordinates with mailing lists of their members, including labels, for sending out post card

reminders of events or perhaps newsletters.

Both the State Office and Subordinate Masters can be provided with such useful data as the occupations, special interests and talents of members, handy when we need expert advice, opinion and help on projects of legislative issues.

We can keep track of ages, from dependent children to retirees, helpful when designing benefit programs and group plans. We can now tailor our programs to fit our people rather than simply devising a plan and hoping the members will ac-

cept and use it.

All in all, the computer is a wise investment. It saves us time. It saves us money. But best of all it is a source of information that better enables our State organization to provide us at the Subordinate level with the leadership and help we need to grow, to enhance our standing in the community, and to make Grange membership a prized, family possession.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to thank those delegates I've talked with over the past few days for

their kind words and helpful suggestions.

I would also ask you delegates to carry back to your Granges my sincere appreciation to our local reporters who labor so hard to keep us informed from the grass roots level.

# **GRANGERS BUSINESS ORGANIZATION**

Once again the fall and winter seasons are upon us and the G.B.O. store has a huge inventory of wood burning stoves, log splitters and chain saws. Also we have an inventory of over 1,500 pairs of Lee Jeans—in colors of brown, green, blue, faded blue and denims priced from \$11.98 - \$12.98.

During the past year G.B.O. sales of Lees Jeans have been terrific. A lot of the sales have been mail order sales and it is

not uncommon to receive an order from a Grange member ordering 4 to 6 pairs of Jeans at one time. For your convenience, we have one pair of each color on display at the G.B.O. booth in the lobby—if any of you members are interested and would like to place an order—I would be very happy to take it and ship them to you on any date you desire.

Also, we stock an excellent selection of leather Western

Wrangler belts at a great savings.

This spring we can look forward to at least a 10% price increase on all turf and garden equipment. Lawn mowers, roto tillers, shredders, etc.

Due to the high interest rates on homes the past year, sales on building materials have been horrible. For example, our sales were down approximately 45% with one of our

plumbing wholesalers this year compared to last year.

We anticipate an excellent season on wood burning stoves, especially on the new Ashley fireplace insert. To date, we have already sold 6 units. This unit converts your fireplace into an efficient air tight coal or wood burning heater. Also, it fits inside most existing fireplaces and takes up no extra room. It is easy to install—no flue connectors, pipes or special tools are needed and the smoke goes right up the chimney stack. The Grange price on this unit is \$510 and the trim kit, which is optional, is \$35.

The G.B.O. Christmas ad will be mailed in November and you should have it in your home around Thanksgiving. There will be an order form in it for your convenience—if there are any items you wish to order, just send in the form with description of item or items. Usually, we will ship your order the

same day we receive it by United Parcel Service.

For members who do not have credit established with us please send check for merchandise and sales tax with your

order and we will bill you for the delivery charges.

G.B.O. cannot publish the financial report ending June 30, 1980 as yet because we have not received the final report from our auditors, Pfanner & Tate. As soon as this report is finalized it will be available for inspection at the G.B.O. store to all Grange members who may be interested.

### CREDIT UNION REPORT

Worthy Master, Distinguished Guests, Brothers and Sisters:

As you can see, I am not Eunice Smith, she is a little taller than I. Eunice is recovering from surgery and sends her best wishes for a most productive conference. I am Barbara Hicks, having the pleasure of being Manager of Butte Grange Credit Union located in Biggs; a member of the Chico Grange and Butte Pomona.

Representing 14 Grange Credit Unions members attending our conference workshop yesterday discussed meeting the challenges of today and tomorrow.

Times are changing as we all know, faster than ever before in this jet age. For instance, prime rates have fluctuated more this year than economists can recall at any other time in history — this week the prime rate is back up to 14%! These rates have great influence on the money situation in our Credit Unions!

Our common bond, our Grange, is facing a challenge of survival in the Credit Union movement today and tomorrow. Several of our Grange Credit Unions this past year have merged, some with other Grange Credit Unions but I'm sorry to say others with Central or Community Credit Unions.

Please, do not get me wrong when I speak of merging outside our organization, these moves have been done after much thought, but the fact remains that these Credit Unions no

longer are in the Grange organization.

We do not advocate merging, but we must keep aware

of member needs and where we are going — set goals!

What must be done to meet the needs of our members both inside our Credit Unions and out? Have we given thought to meeting today's challenges? Are we helping our members with financial counseling, seeing that we've helped to make them and their families financially fit in the face of price and tax increases? Are we encouraging our youth in good financial habits?—They are our future.

When the Credit Union movement started, Roy F. Bergengren, one of its founding fathers stated, "it was an organization to supply its' members with three primary services: 1) an easy and convenient system for accumulating savings; 2) a source of credit at normal interest rates; and 3) (and perhaps most important) a school wherein the members are educated

in the management and control of their own money."

Are we still meeting these ideals? I believe so.

We are unique! Grangers, an organization built on the concept of self-help, where one seeks to improve the economic status of his community: on neighborliness and integrity.

Today, we must look at the challenge of cutting across community lines if we are to continue to exist. We must provide for the entire State Grange community and integrate our varied viewpoints and interests in working toward the common goal of financial fitness.

It has been estimated by experts in the field, that of the approximate 1600 Credit Unions presently operating in California. that the next 5 to 10 years will see only 600 to 800 of them in existence! We (the Grange) will be among them. It's up to you.

The Managers, Boards of Directors and Committee volunteers know that in recent months there have been more rules

and regulations from government regulatory agencies issued than ever before. A regular alphabet soup with Regulation D—Reserve Requirements of Depository Institutions heading the list.

These regulations can not be ignored for they are developing a competitiveness among all financial institutions as never before. Yes, your Credit Union is a financial institution—but let us remember and not forget a unique one—for we are the only financial institution member owned and operated.

Steady growth and financial strength in Grange Credit Unions can be met and I feel should be met by letting our members know what we have to offer in services, such as insurance, various types of share accounts including certificates, financial counseling, high dividend rates as allowed by law, low cost loans, and interest earning share draft accounts, 'the unchecking account'.

In most of our Grange Credit Unions each household member of a Grange is eligible for Credit Union membership and thus a potential Granger, thereby creating a unique circle of growth.

It is essential that we recall why our Granges began Credit Union services to our membership and thus be able to meet the challenges set before us today.

Only you, my fellow Grangers can keep the Grange Credit Union in existence, for we must continue to grow and serve if we are to meet today's challenge tomorrow and I believe we can persevere.

# **GRANGE INSURANCE ASSOCIATION REPORT**

To the Officers and Members of the California State Grange: Following are key figures from GIA's 1979 annual state-

ment, covering insurance written for 77,000 Grange families in eight western states:

GIA's premium income continued to increase in 1979, and, as for the past several years, GIA's growth rate is 25% above

the insurance industry average. Assets and policyholders' surplus (net worth), also showed good increases in 1979. Fueled by increasing interest rates during the year, investment income, derived from investments of members assets, also increased during the year, and was 22.1% above 1978 results.

Since premiums are paid in advance, with losses being paid in the future, inflation takes a particularly heavy toll on insurance companies. While premiums increased 14% in 1979, losses incurred 22%, over 50% faster than premium income. This increase in losses was such that an underwriting loss of \$91.166 was incurred in 1979.

Automobile losses, while not increasing in frequency, cost an average of over 11% more in 1979 than in 1978, as shop labor, medical costs and jury awards rose throughout the year. In 1979, too, after several years of excellent results, property insurance was subject to heavy losses from windstorms and large fire losses. Crop losses were small in 1979, with a loss ratio of 45.8% on hail, and 10.7% on grain fire. Farm machinery losses were modest, too, and showed a good underwriting gain.

Because of the worsening of losses during the year, GIA paid dividends to members only on the last half of 1970 crop hail gains. 1975 underwriting gains, deferred in 1979, will be the first to be reid in the future.

Washington, where GIA commenced business in 1894, continues to produce a major part of GIA's premiums, as the following summary of per cent of premiums derived from each operating state illustrates:

(Oregon, Idaho and Colorado also have local Grange sponsored companies, writing only property insurance.)

The investment of policyholder's funds continues to be an important source of income for the Association, earning \$3½ million in 1979. Ninety percent of invested assets are in bonds, mostly tax exempt. 3.7% of invested assets are in subsidiaries, Rocky Mountain Fire & Casualty Company and Mayflower Corporation, and another 5% are in the common and preferred stocks of other companies. Real estate investment is in the home office building.

GIA, through its holding company Mayflower Corporation, owns over 99% of Rocky Mountain's stock. Rocky Mountain Fire & Casualty Company, like GIA, incurred an underwriting loss in 1979, with investment income offsetting the loss, so that net worth of Rocky Mountain increased \$158,963 in 1979 to a total of \$2,127,773. Rocky Mountain's assets were \$6,856,785 at the end of 1979, increasing 7% from year end 1978. Mayflower Corporation is not active, other than as a holding company for Rocky Mountain stock.

Recognizing that inflation hits our young people, too, GIA increased its scholarship awards in 1980 to \$500 from \$400. Twenty-two such awards were made in April 1980. In addition, Katherine Nielson Eckhart generously continues to fund the "Ed Nielsen Memorial Scholarship," as does Ethel Holter in funding the "Paul Holter Memorial Scholarship." Both Brothers Nielsen and Holter were valued members of GIA's Board of Directors.

GIA completed its present home office building in 1958, and after occupying those quarters for twenty-two years, plans an extension of the home office building on property adjacent thereto. Construction is scheduled to commence in January, 1981, and will be tied to the present home office by sky bridge over the alley separating the two buildings. GIA also has twenty-four branch claims and agency management offices throughout the eight Grange western states. During the past year offices have been opened in Port Angeles, Washington, and in Clairmont and Fresno, California.

GIA's direct premiums written for the first six months of 1980 increased 13.6%. California's increase was 14.7% The direct loss ratios (excluding grain and hail) through July, 1980 were:

Hopefully, the latter part of 1980 will show a reduction in auto losses.

In recognition of the most valuable assistance given by California State Grange to GIA, it's a pleasure to present our contribution of \$4,712.30. This payment is for 10 cents per member, based on your June 30, 1980 reported membership of 47.123.

# REPORT ON UKIAH AUTUMN LEAVES

By Gunnor Erickson, President, Board of Directors Worthy Master, Worthy State Officers, Dignitaries, Brothers and Sisters:

Once again we are approaching that time of year when Ukiah Autumn Leaves will complete the fifth year of success-

ful operation.

This past year we did have a new situation and experience to contend with. I reported at Convention last year that we had a fire on October 2, 1979 in one of the apartments upstairs that completely destroyed one apartment, and damaged four more upstairs apartments, plus heavy water damage to six more apartments on the bottom floor. Total cost of this fire in the complex was \$139,000.00. It took seven months before all repairs were completed and the apartments were once again occupied. We had no loss of income with all these apartments being vacant. On our fire insurance policy there is a 10% loss of earning clause that reimbursed Ukiah Autumn Leaves with full rental value until the apartments were once again ready for occupancy. Without this clause we could have had some big problems, as this amount alone was several thousand dollars. While the tenants, management, and Board learned a lot from this fire, we do hope it does not happen again. We were all extremely lucky, this time.

We had our annual HUD physical inspection the first of September. I'm proud to say our inspection report came back with a "Superior" rating. This includes building appearance, grounds, apartments, maintenance, general upkeep, and long range maintenance planning. These HUD inspectors cover everything pretty thoroughly, and the project is rated by their findings. The people that deserve the most credit for our good rating are our manager and maintenance man. These are the people who usually spot trouble areas and make necessary repairs immediately, thus stopping larger, more costly problems later on. I think Ukiah Autumn Leaves has the best management personnel in the business, and, I might add, they are

also Grange members.

We are having one big headache just like everyone else—inflation! Costs of operation keep going out of sight. We were granted a 9% rent increase by HUD effective last March, and now have had to ask for another increase, all due to ever-rising costs of operation and maintenance. We have not received a reply at this time on our request for increase, but hopefully should by the end of this month.

We have been hoping that some day we could add some 40 to 50 more apartments to this complex, if financing is found, or available from HUD. The need is still as great, if not greater, than ever for this type of housing. It came to my attention that HUD will be once again funding construction of Senior Citizen housing on a "Title 236" program, shortly

after the first of 1981. We have instructed our management firm to check this out immediately, so that we can proceed to qualify for funding if this does happen.

This knowledge might help any of you who may be

thinking of building a project of this kind.

The eligible income limits for a couple were recently increased from \$9.000.00 per year to \$11,000.00 per year, and a single person was increased to \$8,500.00 per year.

The age and disability requirements remain the same as before. However, once you have qualified and moved in, and your income increases later on above limits, for any reason, you will be allowed to continue living in the complex, but your rent will increase to market value rent.

Our tenants association is very active, with many projects to help make life easier and more pleasant for all living here. There are parties, potlucks, card games, sing-alongs, etc., for anyone who wants to attend. Also, all tenants check on each other, in case of sickness or injury, or to help in any other way, which I think is just great.

The management and Board would very much like to encourage anyone who may be thinking of this type of project, and will give any kind of help or information that we are able. We feel that Senior Citizen housing is badly needed throughout the State, and Nation, as well as time and money well spent.
