Session Rules 2005

The Standing Rules of the Convention, will apply only to the 133rd Annual Session of the California State Grange, Redding, California, 2005. (Reference: Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, Chapter XIX, Section 58.)

REGISTRATION FEE: The \$30 registration fee shall be waived for Junior Grangers, invited .. guests, and out of state guests

BADGES: No one will be admitted to the session without a badge which signifies their registration fee has been paid (except as noted above).

DELEGATE REGISTRATION: Closing date and time for Delegate Registration shall be Thursday, OCTOBER 13, 2005 at NOON. Any late registrant MUST have the approval of the State Master.

RESOLUTION CLOSING TIME: The closing time for the acceptance of properly submitted resolutions shall be 12 Noon, THURSDAY, OCTOBER 13, 2005. For committee resolutions, the closing time shall be Friday, OCTOBER 14, 2005 AT 4:00 PM.

RESOLUTION INTRODUCTION: A vote shall not be taken on a resolution unless it has been in the delegates' hands at least two (2) hours.

COMBINING C&BL RESOLUTIONS: Constitutional Resolutions shall not be combined in Committee (SG-36-82)

AMENDMENTS TO RESOLUTIONS: All motions to amend resolutions, which are excessively long, shall be presented in writing to the Secretary's Station, so as to be properly entered into the minutes.

FLOOR MOTIONS IN WRITNG: All motions made from the floor concerning subjects new to the Grange and not presented in resolutions shall be presented in writing to the Secretary's Station, so as to be properly entered into the minutes.

FLOOR DEBATE: Shall be limited to two (2) minutes per delegate on any given question.

OFFICER REPORTS: The written reports of all officers shall be submitted to the Secretary's Station prior to the close of the first day of session for inclusion in the Journal of Proceedings.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: The Executive Committee shall have the authority to approve the minutes of the final day of session at their meeting after the close of the session.

C&BL RESOLUTIONS: All C&BL resolutions shall be presented no later than 1:30 P.M. on the 2nd day of the session and be processed until completed, except for those being recommitted. (91-006)

CONVENTION SITE(S) VOTING: Voting by the delegate body to select future convention sites for the Annual Session of the California State Grange shall be conducted only by paper ballot. (97-003)

Minutes of Annual Session October 13, 2005

Opening of the Grange

Rosemary Hansen, past Executive Committeeman, Flora and Youth Director of the California State Grange and Master of Anderson Grange had the honor of introducing the officers of the California State Grange on the first day of the 133rd annual session

The opening song God Bless America was lead by Brother Bill Booth, Lecturer of the California State Grange.

Worthy Master, Tom Stefenoni, Master of the California State Grange declared the Grange open in the Sixth Degree.

Sister Linda Chernoff, Worthy Flora with the aid of the Assistant Stewards Jeremy Heckman and Susie Laskowski, presented the Flag of our country.

Roll Call of Officers

Roll call of the officers of the California State Grange found all officers present except Assistant Steward Michael Blesch and Gatekeeper Joshua Harper.

Lowering the Grange to the Fourth Degree

Master Stefenoni lowered the session to the fourth degree and all fourth degree members were allowed to enter.

Honored Guests

Honored Guests were escorted to the Master's Station. Terry Hunt, Overseer of the National Grange and Master of the Washington State Grange; William Booth, Past Master of the California State Grange and Sister Lillian; Bob Clouse, Past Master of the California State Grange and Sister Jeanne; John Felder, Past Master of the California State Grange and Sister Pat Berry; Naomi Fletcher, Past Master of the California State Grange; Leo T. Bergeron Past Master of the California State Grange and Sister Kathy were received and asked to give welcoming remarks.

Partial Credential Report

Secretary, Kathy Bergeron, gave a partial credential report. There are 70 Subordinate Granges and 19 Pomona Granges represented and 155 delegates. A quorum was called.

Standing Rules

It was moved by Martha Stefenoni to adopt the Standing Rules amending C & BL Resolutions to Grange Law. Seconded. It was moved by Bill Booth to amend the motion by striking \$30.00 from the registration fee. Seconded. Motion adopted. The motion as amended was adopted.

It was moved by Dale Baker that all resolutions applicable to State Officers, duties, salaries and budget including but not limited to 05-010, 05-012, 05-015, 05-018, 05-020, 05-021, 05-025, 05-030, 05-032, 05-033, 05-042, 05-043, 05-044, 05-048, 05-050, 05-051 and 05-052 be acted on prior to the nomination of officers. Seconded. Motion was adopted.

It was moved by Bill Booth that the budget be presented and the vote taken prior to the nomination of officers. Seconded. Motion was adopted.

Schedule

It was moved by Bill Booth that the schedule be adopted as amended. Seconded. Motion was adopted.

Communications

A letter from the National Master, William Steel, was read by the Worthy Secretary.

Supplemental packets were distributed from the Worthy Steward's station at 9:47am.

Sister Naomi Fletcher, Past Master of the California State Grange addressed the members with greetings from Hiawathaland National Forest in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan and her family.

Executive Committeeman Johnny Squire apologized to the delegates for not highlighting the Executive Committee action items in the minutes as requested by the delegates at last year's convention. He stated the production office dropped the bold highlighting.

Secretary's Report

The Worthy Secretary Kathy Bergeron gave her report.

It was moved to accept the Secretary's report and enter it into the Journal of Proceedings. Seconded. Motion was adopted.

Treasurer's Report

The Worthy Treasurer Heidi Hitt stated following the actions at last year's session, reporting on the financial status of the CSG is no longer the responsibility of the Treasurer and she referred the report to the Master and Executive Committee.

Master's Address

Worthy Overseer, Randall Lewis, was called to the Master's Station. The Worthy Overseer presented the California State Grange Master, Tom Stefenoni, for his report. Master Stefenoni gave the Part 1 of his Good of the Order address.

It was moved to accept Part 1 of the State Masters address and print it in the Journal of Proceedings. Seconded. Motion was adopted.

Officer's and Director's Reports

Norm Dahlia, Director of the Grange Youth Fairs Program, gave his report.

It was moved to accept the Grange Youth Fair Program report and print it in the Journal of Proceedings. Seconded. Motion was adopted.

Amanda Booth stated that since the Treasurer deferred her report to the Executive Committee, she asked when a report would be available. Johnny Squire stated an audit is available. Inger Bevans stated financial information will be given with the budget presentation.

Betty Eyler, Director of the Grange Women's Activities Department gave her report.

It was moved to accept the Grange Women's Activities report and print it in the Journal of Proceedings. Seconded. Motion was adopted.

Randall Lewis, Overseer, gave his report.

It was moved to accept the Overseer's report and print it in the Journal of Proceedings. Seconded. Motion was adopted.

Leo Bergeron stated he and the other Past Masters would like to be allowed to respond to the Worthy Overseer's report.

Bob Clouse and Bill Booth commented on the Worthy Overseer's report.

Jim McDaniel stated he has had excellent communication with the State Grange office.

Johnny Squire also gave comments on the report.

Discussion continued.

Johnny Squire gave the Executive Committee report.

Discussion.

It was moved to accept the Executive Committee report and print it in the Journal of Proceedings. Seconded. It was moved for the previous question, seconded. Motion was adopted. The original motion was adopted.

Approval of the Executive Committee Actions 2004/2005

It was moved to approve the Executive Committee actions with the exception of the actions on page 12 regarding GBO fund. Also page 12, job description of the office manager position and employment advertisement was reviewed and revised; page 16 office manager training and job description; page 16 convention report; page 22 a discussion was held; page 20 Woodbridge and that these items be removed from the approval of the EC actions. Seconded. Motion was adopted.

Discussion. Hank Hitt had several questions and listed them.

Johnny Squire gave his responses.

It was moved to lay the motion on the table until after lunch, seconded. The motion was adopted.

The meeting was recessed for lunch at 12:13pm following the closing of the Bible on the altar, to reconvene at 1:30pm.

The meeting reconvened at 1:44pm and the Bible was opened.

Two supplemental pads were distributed at 1:45pm.

Master's Address

California State Grange Master Stefenoni gave his address, Part 2 – General.

It was moved to accept Part 2 of the Master's Report and print it in the Journal of Proceedings. Seconded. Motion was adopted.

It was moved to remove from the table the motion regarding the Executive Committee Minutes. Seconded. Motion was adopted.

Johnny Squire continued his explanation regarding questions raised.

The minutes from the November 24, 2005 Executive Committee meeting will be approved after they are presented to the delegates as they were not in the original packet.

The tabled motion to approve the Executive Committee actions with exceptions was adopted.

Leo Bergeron discussed page 12 of the Executive Committee minutes regarding the payment for repairs taken from GBO funds and Woodbridge. Bergeron stated the Executive Committee has no authority to use GBO funds unless voted on by a 2/3rds majority vote of the delegate body.

Squire stated they did not spend the GBO funds. They invested the funds in a higher rate of interest than they can receive from CD's. At this point the funds have not been spent.

Bob Clouse gave a brief history of the GBO, Grange Business Organization.

Squire read from the Executive Committee handbook information regarding the authority to invest restricted funds. The information was per resolution #98-079.

Bergeron discussed page 22 regarding a discussion held on a request made by Worthy Secretary Kathy Bergeron and request to know what the discussion was about and the results of the discussion. Squire did not have a full list of the items requested.

Page 12 regarding the job description for the Office Manager was discussed as well as page 16, Office Manager training and description.

Bill Booth discussed page 16, convention report and registration fee.

It was moved to approve the action items withdrawn from the Executive Committee minutes. Seconded. Motion was adopted.

Resolution Processing

Bruce Brunell Chairman of Grange Law presented a partial report.

Resolution 05-012 Amend Article 17.6 of State By-Laws. Required a 2/3rd majority report. Committee action was favorable. Recommendation adopted. **Resolution was adopted.**

Resolution 05-015 Amend Article 14.2 of the By-Laws of the California State Grange. The committee action was unfavorable. The committee believes having seven diverse viewpoints is important.

It was moved to substitute the resolution for the committee report. Seconded. Discussion. It was moved for the previous questions. Seconded. Motion adopted. The motion to substitute the resolution for the committee report failed.

The resolution was back on the floor with a committee recommendation of unfavorable. The recommendation was adopted. **The resolution was rejected.**

Resolution 05-018 The California State Grange “Brown Act”. The committee action was unfavorable. The recommendation was adopted. **The resolution was rejected.**

Resolution 05-020 Abolish Junior Grange State Dues. The committee action was favorable. The recommendation was adopted. **The resolution was adopted.**

Resolution 05-032 State Grange Annual Meeting. The committee action was favorable. **It was moved to amend. Seconded. It was moved for the previous question. Seconded. Motion was adopted. The motion to amend was adopted.** The resolution as amended was adopted. **The resolution was adopted.**

Rosemary Hansen, Chairman of the Grange Activities made a partial report.

Resolution 05-010 The Position of CSG Lobbyist. The committee action was favorable as amended. The recommendation was adopted. **The amended resolution was adopted.**

Resolution 05-021 Departmental Budget Forms. The committee action was favorable as amended. The recommendation was adopted. **The resolution was adopted.**

Resolution 05-025 Schedule of Executive Committee Meeting. The committee action was unfavorable. The committee believes the resolution is too vague and some Granges do not have e-mail. The committee recommendation was adopted. **The resolution was rejected.**

Resolution 05-030 Accountability Resolution. The committee action was favorable as amended. **It was moved to substitution the resolution for the committee report. Seconded. Motion failed.** Discussion. **It was moved to recommit. Seconded. The resolution was recommitted to the Grange Activities Committee.**

Resolution 05-033 California State Grange Budget. The committee action was favorable. **It was moved to amend. Seconded. It was moved to amend the amendment. Seconded. The amendment to the amendment was adopted. The amendment as amended was adopted. The resolution as amended was adopted.**

Resolution 05-042 Full Time Master For CSG. The committee action was favorable as amended. The recommendation was rejected. **It was moved to reject the resolution. Seconded. The previous question was moved. Seconded. Motion adopted. The motion to reject was adopted. The resolution failed.**

Resolution 05-043 Master’s Salary. The committee report was favorable as amended. **It was moved to substitute the resolution for the committee report. Seconded. Discussion. The previous question was**

moved. **Seconded. Motion adopted. The motion to substitute failed.** Discussion. **It was moved to amend. Seconded. Discussion. It was moved for the previous question. Seconded. Motion adopted.**

The motion to amend was rejected. The amendment failed. It was moved for a previous question. Seconded. Motion adopted. The resolution as amended with a favorable committee recommendation was adopted. **The resolution as amended was adopted.**

Resolution 05-044 Master's Salary was withdrawn by the author Grange.

Resolution 05-051 Grange Youth Fair Program Reporting. (Combined with **Resolution 05-057**) Committee report was unfavorable. It was recommended to the leaders of the Grange to prepare a report form to be submitted on a quarterly basis. The resolution singles out the Fair Program from the other departments of the Grange. **It was moved to combing 05-051 and 05-057. Seconded. Motion was adopted.** Discussion. **The previous question was moved. Seconded. Motion was adopted.** The committee recommendation was adopted. **The resolution was rejected.**

Resolution 05-052 Verification of Membership For Grange Youth Fair Activities. (Combined with Resolution 05-050 and 05-056) The committee recommendation was unfavorable. Accounting is now in place. The fairs require this information showing who is a member of the Grange or not before they are allowed to participate. Discussion. **It was moved for the previous question. Seconded. Motion was adopted.** The committee recommendation was adopted. **The resolution was rejected.**

The orders of the day were called for.

The very lively first day of the 133rd Annual Session of the California State Grange was closed in full form by the officers. The Worthy Master rapped the Grange closed at 5:50pm.

Ted Grainger from Butte County presented an honor guard from the Army, Navy, Marines, Coast Guard and Air Force. They assisted him in presenting a "POW/MIA Recognition Dinner" ceremony. Hank Hitt stated a motion was made at the end of last year that the auditing member of the Executive Committee have their remarks and budget talking points included in the delegate packets. **It was moved to postpone the presentation of the budget until the talking points are passed out to the delegates. Seconded. Motion was adopted.**

Norm Dahlia, Grange Youth Fair Program director thanked Jules Faoro and Bob Clouse for sponsoring two of the fourteen buckles they gave at last night's awards ceremony.

Lillian Booth thanked the Executive Committee for the financial report, but she also wanted to know what the actual financial conditions were.

Resolution Processing

Bruce Burnell presented a partial report for the Grange Law Committee.

Resolution 05-005 Adopt Family Membership and Provide Dues. Committee action was favorable. The recommendation was adopted. **The resolution was adopted.**

Resolution 05-038 Streamline Annual Membership Billing. Committee action was unfavorable as they do not want to micro manage the Granges. Discussion. The recommendation was adopted. **The resolution was rejected.**

A supplemental packet was distributed at 10:52am

Resolution 05-045 Secrecy of the Grange. Committee action was unfavorable. We currently have the Action and Vision Grange programs in place. We may sometime in the future need our tools of secrecy. The recommendation was adopted. **The resolution was rejected.**

Resolution 05-014R Disposal of Property of Grange Surrendering Their Charters. The committee action was favorable. Discussion. The recommendation was adopted. **The resolution was adopted.**

A supplemental packet was distributed at 11:01am.

The Worthy Lecturer led the members in singing "Its a Good Thing to Be a Granger".

Liz Finn gave a partial report for the Public Policy Committee.

Resolution 05-001 Divide California Into Two States. The committee report was unfavorable. There are advantages to splitting the state, but because of the current state of the economy it would not be fiscally responsible at this time. Discussion. The recommendation was adopted. **The resolution was rejected.**

Resolution 05-008 Support of Restructure of the Pentagon. The committee report was unfavorable. This resolution did not provide enough specifics to accomplish anything. Discussion. **The recommendation was rejected. It was moved to adopt the resolution. Seconded. Discussion. It was moved for the previous question. Seconded. Motion was adopted. The resolution was adopted.**

The Worthy Overseer turned the sash back over to the Worthy Master.

Resolution 05-11A United States Participation in the United Nations was withdrawn by the author Grange.

Resolution 05-026 Reinstigate Selective Service Draft was withdrawn by the author Grange.

Resolution 05-059 National Emergency Preparedness was withdrawn by the author Grange.

Rosemary Hansen Chairman Grange Activities presented a partial report.

State Master's Address 2005 - Good of the Order

Brothers and Sisters, it's great to be back in Redding for the 133rd Annual Session of the California State Grange. This 133rd Annual Session will mark the eighth time we have met here in Shasta County. While this is our sixth meeting here in the last twenty-six years and the eighth overall, it is to the first Annual Session held in Redding in 1929 I wish to direct your attention.

The 57th Annual Session was significant for several reasons. First, there were two resolutions passed at that Session that were presented by C. J. Sutton, the delegate from Sebastopol Grange #306 and my step-great-grandfather. They dealt with issues that could easily come before us today. One supported the Federal Government's efforts to eradicate the Mediterranean Fruit Fly in Florida and urged the expansion of plant quarantine work to include all maritime ports of entry in this country. The second praised both the State and Federal Governments' fast reaction to an outbreak of foot and mouth disease in California during the preceding year and requested the Secretary of Agriculture to "use his best efforts to secure additional authority and additional men at the maritime ports of entry for the purpose of preventing the introduction of this disease".

The 57th Session also saw the election of Brother George Schlmeyer as State Master and the passage of a resolution carried by Brother Schlmeyer titled, "Water for Irrigation Purposes" that endorsed the construction of the Kennet Dam "to provide water for irrigation for the farmers of these two valleys" (the Sacramento and San Joaquin), thus began the Granges' push to build what we know today as Shasta Dam, the corner stone of the massive Central Valley Project.

Worthy Master, George R. Harrison (also a Sebastopol Grange #306 member), in his address noted that in 1921 many Brothers and Sisters traveling to the 49th State Session in Yreka overnighed in Redding. At that time Siskiyou County was the only Grange county north of Sacramento.

Redding is also special to me as it was here in 1988 that Martha and I competed for the title of Outstanding Young Couple of the National Grange.

Over the past year I have had the opportunity to interact with many Grange members throughout the State. From San Diego to Crescent City, I have attended Grange Youth Fair Events, Grange Youth Conferences, Grange Community Open House Events, Hall Rededication Ceremonies, State and National Grange Sessions and regular Subordinate and Pomona Grange meetings. It is always rewarding to be a part of events that highlight both the Grange and the community in which the Grange is a part. These events bring to the surface the fact that the Grange is community based and, as such is an asset in and a benefit to its community.

However, not all the calls or correspondence I receive are about the opportunities which reflect the positive events that are happening within the Grange and its community. Instead, many of these ask what is wrong with the Grange? Why don't I put more focus on one area of need or another within the Grange and forget about all the rest? What am I doing to rebuild the Grange? Why don't we hear more from you or from the State Grange? Communication issues are ever present. Even though the *California Grange News* goes to every Grange member household, I have found that regular articles in the Grange News are not enough. With the introduction of the new web site, www.californiagrangegrange.org, we will have both the opportunity and vehicle for regular communications to our members, including a Calendar of Events, Legislative Hot Topics, General News that's current and Officer and Director's travel schedules.

Having grown up in the construction business I know well the difference between building a brand new house from the ground up and remodeling an older house. Have you ever remodeled a 132-year-old house?

Remodeling is what's happening with the 132-year old house we know as the California State Grange. In order to assure that the California State Grange could continue in the future, it was necessary to evaluate the structural stability of the State Grange to assure a sound foundation upon which to build upon and grow. In evaluating the structural integrity of California State Grange much like you would evaluate the integrity of a 132-year-old house, I found that the financial foundation was in need of serious repair. Deficit budgets and expenses that had far surpassed income were eroding the very foundation of the Grange. We had to get our finances under control in order to build upon a solid foundation. I hope you can see from the Budget Committee's report that we are diligently working to restore Grange's financial foundation so that we may have a strong base upon which to continue successful existing programs and build new ones.

So it is with the California State Grange. I believe we can all agree that the State Grange needs some updating and repairs. When I was selected as your Master two years ago in Ukiah, I stated after the Installation of Officers that it was my goal to put "Grange" back into the Grange. I believe that in drawing from our traditions we can move into the future.

Another lesson you learn in the remodeling business is to expect the unexpected and find a way to deal with it. The departure of the Executive Director in August of 2004 resulted in the best-laid plans in this remodeling project being revamped to accommodate the management requirements of the office until such time as the Executive Committee could evaluate, assess and determine what direction we would take. The decision was made to hire an Office Manager. I hope you have all had the opportunity to meet our new Office Manger, Phyliss Regino, who has already become a great asset to the California State Grange. Phyliss brings to her position at the State Grange twelve years of experience working for a member-based, non-profit organization where her many responsibilities included web site management and convention planning.

Many times remodeling projects require more attention to detail than building a tract of new houses. The same is true with Granges whose charters have been suspended or revoked. With the help of some trusted individuals we developed a *Granges in Need* program designed to provide a mentor who can help guide and direct these inactive Granges through the process of getting their Grange up and running again. This mentor is a personal representative from the California State Grange authorized to help get this specific Grange back to a healthy, active status. Over the past year, we have had the opportunity to assist two Subordinate Granges reactivate their charters, Big Valley Grange and Muscoy Grange. Through the efforts of their personal mentors, Bro. Frank and Sister, Marian Nichols mentored Big Valley Grange, and Bro. Randy and Sister Linda Lewis mentored Muscoy Grange; these Granges have been reactivated and are requiring less and less assistance from their mentors. This mentor program for *Granges in Needs* requires a great deal of personal time, effort and dedication on the part of the mentor. This is not a program that will be successful if the mentor makes one or two visits to the *Granges in Need* and then does not return to help them assess their progress and determine the next steps to take to achieve the goal of reactivating the Grange. We have a date set for the reorganization meeting of Westside Grange in Red Bluff with Brothers Ernie White and Jack Eyler serving as mentors. There are also other reorganizations currently in the planning stages.

I would personally and publicly like to thank Brother and Sister Nichols and Brother and Sister Lewis for their time, effort, and dedication with the rechartering of Big Valley Grange and Muscoy Grange.

The GWA program under the direction of Sister Betty Eyler, the Youth Department guided by Bro. Bill and Sister Patty Allen, Family Health under the direction of Sister Leslie Parker, Community Service helmed by Brother Bob Lange and the Grange Expo directed by Sister Katie Squire are found to be in good working order. Thank you to all who have worked with these Directors in making these programs successful.

Sister Lucette Moramarco has done an outstanding job in working to develop and maintain the Junior Program Grange in California. National Grange has undertaken a review of the Jr. Grange program because, despite the best efforts of Directors such as Sister Moramarco, the Junior Grange is struggling. In your resolution packet you will find a resolution that offers a suggestion to National Grange for a change to the Junior Grange program. We need to find a way to help Junior Grange become a more significant part of our local Granges.

Compared to the other programs within the Grange structures, the Grange Youth Fair program is one of the most visible and can have some of the most significant impact. Bro. Norm and Sister Lori Dahlia are constantly working to promote the Grange Youth Fair Program for which we are grateful.

All programs need to work together as Grange programs to promote the California State Grange.

In closing I would like to thank a number of individuals, who have helped to make these past two years as Master of the California State Grange the adventure it has been:

First, the office staff, whose interest in the welfare of the California State Grange and dedication to doing their jobs makes any Master's job easier;

Next to the Officers and Directors and Deputies of the California State Grange, your dedication to our organization is a true inspiration to us all;

To the Executive Committee and Overseer of the California State Grange, never have I worked with a Board made up of such a diverse group of individuals who can come together as a team, putting aside their own wants and desires, to make the tough decisions on behalf of and in the best interest of the California State Grange;

To the members of our organization, located in communities throughout the state, thank you for your support and hospitality.

And, finally, to my family Martha and Joseph for your love and the sacrifices you have had to make along the way. It is a journey I could not have made alone.

State Master's Annual Report 2005

NATIONAL GRANGE SESSION

This past year we, as your delegates carried to National Grange Session a resolution that had been passed many times at the state level seeking a change to the National Grange By-laws that would allow wine to be served at Grange functions. With support from a number of other states and a push from the National Master the resolution finally passed. The Executive Committee is presenting a resolution at this session to bring the language of the California State Grange By-laws into agreement with the revised National Grange By-laws.

LEGISLATIVE ADVOCACY

Legislative advocacy in the Grange comes in many different packages. Face-to-face meetings, e-mail, faxes, mail or phone calls, all have their place. We will be encouraging the membership in the coming year to become more involved in contacting their local representatives. Regardless of the presentation or the particular audience there are certain constants. First, the key to Grange policy development is the fact that it occurs from the bottom up. The policy comes from majority action of a representative delegate body acting upon resolutions submitted by local Granges. Second, our advocacy is strictly issues oriented and does not enter the arena of partisan politics. Third, we advocate our issues without the benefit of, or, in many cases, the hindrance of a Political Action Committee (PAC).

NATIONAL LEGISLATIVE FLY-IN

This year's National Legislative Fly-in was moved to March from May and the formal program was shortened by one day. This schedule change did allow us more time on the hill, which was, after all, our purpose in being there. The program was still high-quality. Monday's Capitol Hill Club seminar topics included: *Renewable Energy in the 21st Century*; *Telecommunications Reform*; *Social Security Reform*; and *Implementation of the Medicare Modernization Act*. However, on Tuesday morning our work there began in earnest. Tuesday was the first of three full days on the "Hill". Coming into this year's Fly-in, it was my expressed intent to do something that we had not done before, make contact with our entire Congressional delegation and both U.S. Senators. Visiting fifty-three congressional offices and two senatorial offices in three days was a push, but we succeeded. The CSG delegation of Master Tom and Martha Stefenoni, Overseer Randall and Linda Lewis, the Heckmans, Karen, Jeremy and Katie, and Maggie Bloom ably and faithfully served our State Grange in this endeavor. The Brothers Lewis (Randy and son, Richard who manages a Kinkos) assembled a packet for each of the Congressional offices we visited which included an introduction letter from the State Master and Overseer, a brief history of the CSG and position papers on six issue area. These position papers represented issues as diverse as the membership of the CSG. The six issue areas we presented were: Endangered Species Act (ESA) Reform; HR 997, English as the Official Language of the U.S.; BSE & COOL (Country of Origin Labeling); Oppose HR 355 and S153, Rim of the Valley Corridor Study Act; Support reauthorization of the Carl D. Perkins Vocational Education Funds, S.250 and HR 366; and Broad Band Access for Rural Areas. Some of our visits were brief as we left our business cards and position papers with a legislative aid in the office and picked up cards for the staffers who had policy responsibility for Agriculture, Natural Resources and Education issues. Other visits were fairly lengthy and included some serious, in-depth discussions on the issues we included in our position papers. As with our time on the hill last year, it seemed that some of our best meetings and most frank discussions occurred with staff members of Representatives with whom we had no prior relationship and who knew little of the Grange, our history or politics. Many of these were representing predominantly urban areas, yet were interested to listen to our concerns over rural issues. Congressman Richard Pombo arranged for us to lunch in a U.S. Capitol meeting room and spoke to our group over lunch. A highlight was attending Senator Diane Feinstein's "California Breakfast" and being one of a few individuals who were singled out for introduction by the Senator to the group. Thanks also go to National Legislative Director, Leroy Watson and legislative staff member Chil-Sook Wang for the program planning and arranging a number of our Congressional appointments. The contacts we made in those four days can only serve to pay dividends in the future.

LIVESTOCK EXPORTS AND ANIMAL IDENTIFICATION

A nation-wide Animal Identification program still isn't in place but several pieces of legislation are pending which are moving it towards implementation. A key element of Grange policy supporting the implementation of a nation-wide animal identification plan is the requirement for adequate funding for the program through USDA.

Legislation currently pending in Congress (HR 3170) would allocate no more than the \$33,000,000 of the estimated \$70,000,000+ in first year costs to implement the program at the local level. The BSE scare is still affecting the beef export market and it is through the benefit of a strong domestic market that the price of beef remains up. The FDA has recently announced new measures to help further protect consumers from the agent thought to cause BSE. The Agency is proposing to amend its animal feed regulations to prohibit from use in the food or feed of all animals certain "high risk" cattle materials that can potentially carry the BSE-infective agent.

ESA REFORM

In last year's report to this delegate body I noted that 2004 might well go down in history as THE breakthrough year for the reform of the Endangered Species Act. The significance of the passage out of committee of two bills (HR 2933 and HR 1662) should not be minimized. Although neither came to a vote before the House, they laid the groundwork for things to come. This year HR 3824, the "Threatened and Endangered Species Recovery Act of 2005" (TESRA) was introduced by House Resources Committee Chairman, Richard Pombo with bipartisan support and sponsorship. H.R. 3824 amends the Endangered Species Act and offers a new emphasis on recovery with new Recovery Teams and Recovery Tools. Recovery Plans would be required by law, within two years of listing, and will be reviewed regularly to make sure they are as effective as possible. Recovery Teams will draw not only from those with skills and knowledge essential to guide effective conservation efforts, but also those who have property or livelihoods affected by species where any successful program must be made to work. This will foster collaborative rather than confrontational recovery programs. TESRA replaces the critical habitat program with a more integrated recovery planning process that includes the identification of specific areas that are of special value to the conservation of the species, which are given priority in recovery efforts. TESRA requires the Secretary of the Interior to establish criteria that will constitute a clear definition of "best available" to strengthen the law's scientific underpinnings. Better science leads to better decisions. TESRA represents a paradigm shift by placing emphasis on private property owner's participation in species recovery.

PACIFIC LEGAL FOUNDATION

While we continue to work with Pacific Legal Foundation (PLF) on a number of issues and on a number of fronts, we have recently been informed by PLF that California State Grange v. Evans and the National Marine Fisheries Service is now officially closed and our attorney-client relationship is terminated. This may be a first! The case invalidated and set aside the Southern Oregon/Northern California Coho salmon listing based on 9th District Court Judge Hogan's ruling in the *Alesea case* which held that hatchery-spawned salmon are biologically indistinguishable from "wild" salmon.

CSG v. Norton - The suit filed in March seeking to have the U.S Fish and Wildlife Service abide by Section 4 (c) (2) of the Endangered Species Act and do the mandated five year reviews of listed species has been settled out of court with the service agreeing to have the reviews completed on 194 listed species by 2013 with the first reviews due for completion by September 30, 2006.

GIA

The relationship with Grange Insurance Association continues to be strong. The supportive member program and the Services Agreement remain solidly in place. At the Annual Meeting of the Company in Seattle in March, Chairman of the Board, Darelled Larrigan hosted the state masters for an open but informal discussion about the relationship of the State Granges and GIA. We were also given the opportunity to address the full board where I encouraged them to continue marketing to Grange members and recognizing the relationship between GIA and the Grange which goes back to 1894.

GRANGE PROPERTIES

The Grange Triangle continues to provide the California State Grange a home base for our operations, a comfortable working environment and much needed rental income. This summer long-time tenant California Association of Resource Conservation Districts (CARCD) gave up their office space in the GBO Building to move to newer ADA compliant quarters. UCD Med Center, soon thereafter, committed to leasing the space. So, we are again fully rented. UCD already has informed us that when the proposed Wisteria Hall Project is completed, they will be ready to lease 2101 Stockton Blvd. Again keeping us fully rented.

Thanks to the generosity of Monterey Bay Grange the parking lot at the State Grange Headquarters has been resurfaced, removing many low spots, cracks and uneven sections. This work has been very positively received by our tenants, employees and visitors and has made the Grange Triangle, once again, a safe place to park.

COALITIONS, PARTNERS AND FRIENDS

FFA

It was, once again, my pleasure to participate in the California Association of FFA's 77th Annual State Leadership Conference in Fresno. The Conference brings together over 4,000 FFA members from throughout the state. I continued the California State Grange's history of judging the FFA State Proficiency contests by serving as one of three judges in Agri-entrepreneurship and in both Placement and Entrepreneurship Proficiency in Specialty Crop Production. The young leaders I interviewed for the awards were all well versed in their subject matter and very involved in their projects.

We also participated in their Career Show, bringing to the FFA some good old Grange grassroots legislative advocacy. We brought with us information on the Carl D. Perkins Vocational and Technical Education Act of 1998 and the role it plays in funding vocational education, especially vocation agricultural education at the state level through the FFA program. The act had sunsetted and legislation to reauthorize funding was pending in Congress. We let them know how important passage of H.R. 366, the "Vocational and Technical Act for the Future" was to them and the future of their program. We provided pre-printed post cards informing their Congressman that they were a FFA member residing in their district and how they had long-supported vocational education. They also urged the Congressman to support the passage of H.R. 366.

I had an additional opportunity to interact with a small group of FFA leaders when I was invited to participate in the FFA's Sacramento Leadership Experience. Speaking to forty of the organizations top leaders in small groups and one-on-one gave me the opportunity to speak to them about the Grange, the relationship between Grange and FFA and how they can get involved with the Grange at the local or state level.

FOSTER PARENTS ASSOCIATION

Martha and I had the opportunity to represent both the California State Grange and the National Grange at the National Foster Parents Association (NFPA) Annual Conference in Southern California. My first exposure to the NFPA was in Rochester, NY and last year's National Session. Many State and local Granges have very strong, on-going relationships with the Foster Parents Association in their State and Community. The relationship between our organizations seems to be a "natural". We are both family oriented, community based, share a belief in God and Country and have a structure that provides a certain consistency from one area to another. We have programs the entire family can participate in. They have families (sometimes very large families) looking for family activities. I encourage each local Community Grange to contact your local NFPA Chapter and explore the possibilities

Overseer's Report - Randall A. Lewis, CIC

Worthy Master, distinguished guests, fellow brothers and sisters. It is a pleasure to be able to welcome you to this 133rd Annual State Grange session in Redding, and to address you with my view of what has transpired during this past year. The Executive Committee and State Master have worked very hard to bring about changes to both our operational and budgetary standing. We have had to respond to many challenges and deal with many situations, some that I never imagined could happen. The past year has been one of returning to the practice of following the rules of the organization and making decisions based on those rules. I invite you to read the past Executive Committee minutes and see the details of what we have accomplished during this past year.

Although we have not been able to impact the declining membership at this point we have been able to poise the organization for responding to that challenge in the very near future. One of the issues you will see and need to approve is a proposal to remodel Wisteria Hall, and move the California State Grange office into the newly remodeled facility. The University of California Davis will rent the downstairs office we vacate, providing us with non-dues income to spend on membership programs.

I would like to read two definitions I got from a dictionary on the internet. I don't mean to imply you don't understand the English language, but want to discuss a concept with you. Please try to visualize how these two words apply to the situation we find ourselves in. The words I want you to focus on are the words decision and rule. The dictionary defines Decision as: "The ability to decide quickly and without pausing because of uncertainty." The definition of Rule is: "An accepted principle or instruction that states the way things are or should be done, and tells you what you are allowed or are not allowed to do."

You see decision and rule are tied together by their very nature. You can't make a decision without knowing the rules to apply to the situation. And if you don't know the rules it will either cause you to make a bad decision or will delay the decision due to the uncertainty of what to do.

Some of your Worthy Past State Grange Masters rebelled this past year and formed a vigilante group they casually named the "Order of the Plough." Your State Grange does not sanction this group, and some of its members have created the illusion your Executive Committee is not following the rules and are not working for the good of the order. Some members of this group are attempting to discredit the Executive Committee and blame them for many of the troubles of the State Grange. None of these claims are the truth. This vigilante group has worked outside the framework of the State Grange, and has created turmoil when they could have worked from within and had a positive impact.

In a letter dated September 10, 2005, which I assume they mailed to all of the granges in California, the Worthy Past State Grange Masters stated "We unanimously agreed that the most important change needed is new leadership," Then in the same paragraph a little further on they stated "We believe that these younger Grangers, working under the guidance of older and experienced members, can create the strong membership program we need to revitalize the State Grange." Worthy Past State Grange Masters you of all people know the way to build a strong membership program is either build one from within the organization, or hire an outside firm to assist in building one. I prefer the latter choice since we would have the insight of professionals who could keep us from making mistakes. I guess the question to you is, what can new leadership do that hasn't already been tried? Oh yes, I forgot, your "guidance" will make the difference. I would like to ask where was that guidance this past year?

The Subordinate Granges are the key to building membership. If they are active in their communities performing valuable services and hosting enjoyable activities their membership will increase. The California State Grange certainly needs to provide support to them. There is no silver bullet you can shoot to correct all of the problems we are currently having in regard to membership. That is why I am so disappointed that some of the Worthy Past State Grange Masters have decided to work outside the current leadership. I am providing all of you with copies of the minutes from the meetings of the "Order of the Plough" so you can see the discussions that have taken place. The Steward has copies to hand out to you at the conclusion of my report. Most of the topics in the minutes have been discussed many times during previous meetings, and some are indeed good ideas. Unfortunately, some of the statements made by members of this group are very disturbing.

For the past year the current Executive Committee and State Master have strived to make decisions based on the rules of the organization, and what makes sense for the long-term viability of the Grange. During this last year the Worthy Past State Grange Masters have not volunteered to work with or provide "Guidance" to this Executive Committee. Why do you suppose they didn't offer their support and "Guidance" to this new leadership who was just elected two years ago? Will they withdraw their support and "Guidance" from new leadership if they don't do as they are told? Why are they working outside of the organization rather than participating from within the organization?

Their letter ended by saying "We pray that by working together, we can find the courage and the unity to make the changes needed to save our beloved California State Grange." Are you kidding? Where have they been during this past year? Oh yes I forgot, they have been trying to decide who to nominate for office at this state grange convention. You will read in their minutes who they will be nominating for office. Basically, they formed an "Order of the Plough" nominating committee!

Brothers and Sisters, we all need to work together in the spirit of fraternity to be able to move this great organization into the bright future. We don't need continued controversy for the sake of controversy! Can't we all just get along? I for one certainly hope so.

It appears to me that although the Worthy Past State Grange Masters had the best of intentions, they have gone about it in the wrong way. We are a grassroots organization. We are not one that operates through an illegal committee making decisions for the delegate body. Of all people, the Worthy Past State Grange Masters should have known to do this differently. I hope they have made a misjudgment in the application of their hopes and ideas. If however, they are trying to usurp the authority of the elected officers and the grassroots delegates, then we do have a problem. Perhaps some of the internal struggles we see in the Subordinate Granges have now made their way to the state level. It's the old do it my way, or I will get you thrown out of office.

Brothers and Sisters, we can't allow a negative frame of mind to take over any part of our organization. I for one am standing here before you and saying; "Stop it right now!"

If you aren't part of the solution then you are part of the problem. Worthy Past State Grange Masters, are you going to continue to be part of the problem, or will you join us in moving this organization back to the forefront? I welcome you with open arms, but cut out the sideshow and roll up your sleeves. I promise you we do have a bright future! By working together we will all succeed in returning this great organization to prominence.

Thank you for allowing me to serve as your California State Grange Overseer. I have enjoyed working to improve our organization and would be proud to continue.

As I reported last year the Secretary position changed to a "fraternal Secretary" with the regular duties turned over to a capable staff at the CSG headquarters. I have continued to maintain a tracking visibility only by monitoring schedules, deadlines and reports. I no longer take the minutes at the Executive Committee meetings, but I am happy to be here taking minutes of our annual session.

Jay, Summer, Amy and now Phyliss, thank you all for your hard work. I truly appreciate your quick response and professionalism.

Our process took a bump this past year when Corissa our Secretary Assistant resigned to be able to take another position and broaden her horizons. We all wish her well. The position of Secretary's Assistant was not replaced. In their infinite wisdom, I am sure the Executive Committee knows what they are doing. It has made my position a little bit more difficult because I don't know which staff person has taken over which duty previously performed by the Secretary Assistant, but I am sure the duties are being reassigned and any bumps we might experience will soon be smoothed out if they aren't already.

Once again this year the CSG Roster was not printed and distributed to the Granges on time. Our Constitution and By-laws state Article XI, 11.7 a)"The State Grange shall see that the Grange Roster is compiled, printed and mailed to all of the various Granges of the divisions of the Order no later than sixty (60) days following the election and installation dates as established in Paragraph 14.4 of Article XIV of these By-laws". Sixty days would be around March 1st. As I did last year, I sent multiple requests and finally made a threat. And our Roster in violation of the Constitution and By-laws of the California State Grange was mailed to the Granges on July 1, 2005.

I received a response from the Executive Committee to my request for help from them that stated "The Executive Committee has determined this is a fraternal function under the control of the State Secretary's office and the Master's office and not part of the business and financial functions of the Grange." However, remember there is no Secretary's office. And I cannot imagine how a violation of our Constitution and By-laws does not fall under business functions of the Grange, but...this is one of those bumps that we experience which will be smoothed out if they aren't already.

Last, I have never received any guidelines on what truly goes into a Secretary's report, so you are treated to my interpretation, however I would imagine at the very least you should know how many members were reported on our last quarterly report to the National Grange. I have this information because I asked for it. Not because as State Secretary I am entitled to it. My name does appear on the signature line that is electronically sent to the National Grange, however I did not see the report until it had been sent even though

I made numerous requests that anything with my name on it be approved by me prior to being sent out. Oh well, just another bump that I am truly sure will be smoothed out if it hasn't already.

At this time last year the California State Grange had 11,962 members. On our last quarterly report, we show 10,458 members. That is a drop of 1,504 members.

However I am not sure of those figures. I had questions regarding 11 Granges on our June quarterly report. As I was not able to get an answer from the CSG office, I contacted the National Grange. The result is that I asked them to remove my name from the report and void it. Until I am satisfied with the figures entered on that report or it is revised, I will not sign my name to it. Just another bump.

Executive Committee Report, Presented by Johnny Squire, Chairman

Worthy Master, Officers and Directors, Delegates, Brothers and Sisters I would like present to you the Executive Committee Report.

In the past two years we have gotten the California State Grange financial house in order and stopped the hemorrhaging of red ink, your funds. The 2004 Audit, which is available for review at the properly prescribed stations, shows slightly over \$6000 in the black. For fiscal year 2005, as of the end of June, we show a very healthy \$70,000 in the black. But, I must caution you to remember that convention is a large expense that still must be paid. We are confident that by the end of the year we will remain comfortably in the black. This is contrast to a number of years in the past. There have been no property sales in the last two years that have gone into the operational funds (budget) of the California State Grange. We, your Executive Committee, have continued to fine tune, as necessary, the monthly financial report format so that we can get better information from it.

The California State Grange has been carrying some very high accounts receivables. This is partly due to Granges owing quarterly dues, closed granges with dues owed and one Grange with a huge A/R due to certain expenses, (all appropriate), which took place some four years ago. This has now been paid. The California State Grange has started a process of going after back dues that are owed. The dues owed by closed Granges, accumulated over a number of years and administrations, will have to be written of in an

orderly manner. Our Master is working with the accounting department to work out a fiscally responsible plan to do so.

We now have up and running our new California State Grange website. The address is www.californiagrango.org. New things are being added as fast as possible. Shortly all subordinate and community Granges will be offered the opportunity to have a “sitelet” on the website free of charge. You will be able to list your information and activities for your membership as well as Grange members everywhere. There is no end in sight for what we can do with this website. But please remember this, if you don’t provide the information it cannot be placed on the website. The website will be managed through the California State Grange office rather than by a remote Webmaster that we have to send information.

This year we created an Office Manager position, advertised for and filled the position. Phyllis Regino, is very well qualified, having come from a membership based organization that was of service to its members. There was an uncanny resemblance to the needs of the Grange office reflected in her resume’. As she has become more familiar with the Grange she is fitting in better all of the time.

West Visalia Grange: The Worthy Master revoked the Charter of West Visalia. We have been involved in two lawsuits concerning this Grange; we won one, and are involved in another. This one is a foreclosure. The Master of West Visalia obtained a loan, secured by the grange property, cashed the check at a check cashing “joint”, and there have been no payments made on the loan. We are trying to prevent foreclosure on the property. There were certain procedural deficiencies in obtaining the loan and because of continued litigation I cannot provide more information at this time. There have been inquiries by a contractor to be paid for substantial work done at the hall. We anticipate there may well be more lawsuits in the future as well. The Master of West Visalia is charged with a number of felony counts in Tulare County, all revolving around Grange Youth Fair activities. He has even tried to secure another loan on the property, but because there was a shadow on the title we were able to stop it.

We found another Grange where the ownership of the hall was transferred without the knowledge of the California State Grange. We are working to clear up that issue.

These are two instances that show why it is important to somehow include the California State Grange on the title of your Grange properties. When something starts to happen the California State Grange will be notified and can step in to protect the interests of the Grange, whether it is local or state.

This Executive Committee has taken a hard stand in opposition to the sale of Grange Halls. We feel once a hall is sold, the Grange in that community will be lost within a short period. Without a hall it is nearly impossible to reorganize a Grange in a community. We have turned down several requests to sell and have suggested different alternatives to selling the halls.

Wisteria Hall Project: We have been working on a proposed project to remodel Wisteria hall into a new office space and to move the California State Grange to these offices. This would allow for the rental of the bottom floor of the main building. We do not need near the office space that we now occupy. By remodeling Wisteria Hall into appropriately size offices, with updated restroom facilities, modernized kitchen and meeting space we would be very comfortable. When we approached UCD Medical Center, asking if they would be interested in leasing the space their answer was not can we talk about it, but “when can we plan on having it in our hands?” There will be a presentation of the concept later during the convention and you will be asked to approve the concept.

As many of you know the California State Grange membership database has been problem since day one. We have hired a professional to fix it and hopefully in a short period of time it will operate, as it should. Then the California State Grange database will be able to be corrected so that it agrees with the local Grange membership list.

Communication is a two way street. There has been a lot said about no communication from the California State Grange office. This is a problem that we must solve. But, there has also been little or no communication from “Grange land” back to the Executive Committee.

We believe the California State Grange is now on sound financial footing and can go forward into a bright future.

We need the input from all to meet the needs of the Grange, throughout California. I also believe the Overseer should be involved. I must admit that I did not always agree with some of the decisions but I support the Ex. Committee actions.

Having served on the Finance and Budget committee this year has been a challenge. We are proud to have a balanced budget. We need to find ways to support the programs of the Grange. The individual Departments should help in fund raisers and make an effort to support themselves.

We have met the Megan law requirements in implementing a Background check procedure. This is another way to protect and serve our youth.

We are very fortunate to have such a competent office staff in Sacramento. Our new office manager is a delight to work with and I know the Grangers will be pleased with the improvements that are being made. Our bookkeeper is a pleasure to work with and she has our financial records and accounts organized in a very professional and friendly way. She is available whenever we have questions about the financial workings of our organization. The property manager, (which is a big job) and news paper editor has been in the office for many years and his work is appreciated. Our receptionist has been taking on new duties and responsibilities graciously and efficiently.

Legislative issues are of great importance. The Ex. Comm. knows this and it is one of our top priorities. We hope to have a Legislative Director, when funds are available. We also need a viable Membership Director and Deputy Force.

I'm pleased that we have been able to make a contact with someone that can be of great help in the grant process. This should be a valuable resource to all Granges seeking grants.

The Grange is a wonderful family and service organization. We need to work together and not pull apart into separate groups. Bring your concerns to the State officers and Ex. Committee. Let's seek new ways to raise funds for the good of the order. Invite your friends and neighbors to join this wonderful organization. Family Health Resources - Leslie S Parker

Greetings Brothers & Sisters! I wasn't able to give my entire director's report at convention and I thought you all might like to read it too!

Most of this years activity took place as distribution of information. The majority of it was email, though I reflected many those H. E. A. L. T. H. e-notes in my articles for the Grange News and copies were always mailed to granges & grangers requesting other specific Information.

Our theme this last year, "Ready? Set? PREPARED!", was timely, don't you think? I hope we can take a lesson from the recent occurrences happening to our fellow Citizens in the Southern areas of the United States and try to benefit from it, some time in the future. This is why we have elected to continue the theme as "**Personal Preparedness**" through the coming year.

Much of the material presented was from the internet website www.ready.gov . How much better off would so many of those displaced people have been, if they had had a 72 hour kit in a back pack with food, water, clothing, a blanket and other emergency supplies to grab and take with them when the word came to evacuate.

We each have our own "Katrina's", "Rita's" & "Wilma's" whether they affect us personally, as a subordinate grange, as community or a State. Our "Katrina" could be sudden unemployment, an accident or illness of a parent, spouse or child, fire damaging or destroying our home, crop failure, any number of drastic situations that affect our ability to go about our life's normal daily activities.

In the packet that your delegate at convention received, are two items from Family Health Resources. The first is a quiz. This is to help you determine how prepared you are for an emergency. The second is a handout on how to improve your personal readiness. Please ask your delegates to bring that to your meeting or send you a copy, so that all members of your Grange and their families can benefit and be prepared. Both of these items can also be downloaded from the website: www.californiagrangecom.com.

Mt. Vernon Grange #453 up in Auburn (north of Sacramento) invited us to do a program as they do every year. Christina Fletcher, my husband, Ed & I attended their meeting and presented a program which, among other things, included these two items. I was delighted to see that more than half the members present could answer positive to most of the questions on the quiz. One of the recommendations the handout is to have a years supply of food, and other necessities on hand. One sister put me on the spot asking if I had a years supply of food. I was glad I could answer her saying that while we don't have an entire year of food Storage, we do have about 6 months worth plus a 55 gallon drum filled with water.

Most people have a supply of canned goods they may or may not use - these are good for emergency use though aren't particularly good to carry about if you have to evacuate. Of course, a 55 gallon drum of water isn't particularly portable either. I asked my mother one time, if she had given thought to having a 72 hour kit. She surprised me by saying they had a 30 day kit - sitting out on the driveway on six wheels (their motor home). Some of you may have one of those as well. I urge you to have at least a 3 day supply of food, water etc in a portable conveyance ready for your use. "Portable" doesn't mean your car - you may not always be able to use your car. Also keep in mind that you may have to carry it a distance so a back pack or knapsack may be more desirable than a suitcase or a duffle bag even if it's on wheels.

Keep watch in the mail, on the website and in the Grange News for more information, projects you can adopt and little suggestions to get you, your grange and your community, ready for your own "Katrina".

Back to this year's activities: At convention, we had a superb event.

In January I contacted several people in Redding to see if there was any interest from the community in a Sign-a-song competition. My first contacts were not promising and I have to admit I almost chucked the whole idea. Then on September 20th on a whim I sent a short email to one of the two people who had responded so many months earlier. The next day I received 2 phone calls and 3 emails. Oh my!! Might this really be possible, I thought? Of course, I responded.

With my Redding contact, we set a deadline for pre registration at Sep 30. More phone calls and a plethora of email continued. The result? On Thursday night we had for the preliminary competition 5 professional, 4 group and 9 individual public and grange contestants in an SRO (standing room only) crowd, totaling **137** people. Then to a combined audience of public and grange members we held the finals in conjunction with the Lecturer's Talent Show.

The reviews from the contestants and attendees were so great that the participants and audience want to know if we are going to have this competition again next year. You should have seen their faces when I said that we were indeed going to have this competition again next year. But then I told them that convention was to be in Bakersfield. I told them we'd see what we could arrange for a competition separate from the CSG Convention.

12:32 PM (Tom Stefenoni) I want to take this opportunity to relate to you all the status of our network server at CSG. This morning was the first in many that Jay did not have to reset or adjust settings to make the email system function. We have not been able to back-up the system and data base for over a month (this includes financial data). In order to preserve system resources, Jay is shutting down the server over the long holiday weekend. We are, as they say out west, "at the end of our rope". And yes, we have tied a knot in the end and are doing our best to hang on. Bottom line is the new hardware and updated software is needed now (if not yesterday). Please take the necessary vote and authorize this project before it becomes a major resurrection and reconstruction project. (This is a YES vote.)

9:18 PM – (Inger Bevans) **I move to replace the server and other hardware immediately; also to borrow from the restricted funds if necessary. I also vote yes.**

11:59 PM – (Marian Nichols) I vote yes to purchase the Server. I hope the generous offer to purchase it still stands. (Marian's response is also a second to the motion.)

Discussion was held regarding the pricing by Winnet. Comparisons were done online for the same equipment direct from HP.

November 26, 2004 9:03PM (Robert Lange): (YES vote)

My concerns are the same as John's. There is no doubt in my mind or in anyone else's mind that Winnet charges us an inflated amount on everything they do. At this point, being an emergency, we are stuck with doing it. Tom, you have my vote to replace the server but you need to confront Winnet about the price and consistent service of your system in the future. You need to tell them that the golden goose has stopped production.

November 28, 2004 10:19 PM (Johnny Squire) (YES vote)

I vote to approve the replacement of the server now and to finance it in the manner laid out in an earlier e-mail by a loan from the restricted funds. (It was suggested that we borrow from the restricted funds with a signed note, 60 monthly payments, at 3% interest. We pay it back monthly or as grants come in we can then pay it back outright.)

November 29, 2004 1:45 PM (H. Tom Sawyer) (YES vote)

I have done some detailed comparisons of the Server costs. Comparisons were difficult because Winnet did not detail the hardware entirely. These costs are based on list prices and we should ask for a discount particularly for a non profit organization. With this it is certain that we are ok to go NOW with Winnet and I recommend that we do without more discussions. HF Tom Sawyer

8:13 PM (Johnny Squire)

I now call an end to the vote. All members except Lewis responded.

The vote was 6 aye, 0 nay. The order to replace the server now is approved.

Worthy Master please proceed as quickly as it is practical to get our current server replaced.

Please keep in mind our concern about the cost of the replacement.

Moved by Sawyer, seconded by Nichols that Tom Stefenoni and Randy Lewis be elected as the Background Check Committee. Motion Adopted unanimously.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT:

Sister Katie Squire, Expo Director, joined the meeting. She expressed concern about the facility in Redding providing sufficient space for Expo and the other department GWA Fund Raisers. The CSG also need to develop a procedure for transferring funds from depts. to Expo for paying awards

FINANCIAL REPORT:

Nancy K. joined the meeting. Discussed looking at moving Restricted Accounts into an Asset Management Account. It was agreed to start the process of determining the liquidity needed in these funds in order to have a recommendation for the next Executive Committee meeting. The Finance Sub-Committee was assigned this task. Proceeds of the sale of Gridley Grange Hall were discussed.

A Note Payable, stating the interest rate to be paid, will be written obligating the State Grange to repay these "restricted funds" in order to create a paper trail which has not always been the process in the past. The authorization to use GBO restricted funds given at the 2002 Annual Session will be written as a long-term note. Any GBO funds "utilized" based on the authorization given at the 2004 Annual Session will be handled as a grant.

Moved by Lewis, seconded by Lange that a 10-year note for \$28,000 at 3% interest be written for the funds authorized for use at the 2002 Annual Session from the GBO restricted funds. Motion Adopted unanimously.

Moved by Lewis, seconded by Lange that a 20-year note for \$93,000 at 3% interest be written for the proceeds from the sale of Gridley Grange that were deposited in the CSG General Fund. Motion Adopted unanimously.

Moved by Lewis, seconded by Lange that funds from Fair Valley Grange be moved from the Asset Management Account to the California State Grange account to manage that building. Motion Adopted unanimously.

COMPUTER EQUIPMENT UPDATE:

Tom Stefenoni had reviewed the updated computer equipment with WINNET and WINNET assures him that the updates they propose are what are needed to get our system up and running again. The contract has been signed and the equipment should be in shortly.

LAPTOP COMPUTER:

Moved by Lewis, seconded by Lange that the State Master be authorized to purchase a laptop computer for his office with all the necessary hardware and software that would be needed both in the office and out on the road. Motion Adopted unanimously

DIGITAL CAMERA:

Moved by Lewis, seconded by Nichols that the Master be allowed to take the CSG digital camera to use in his travels and to purchase a small digital camera for the office if a need for photos should arise. Motion Adopted unanimously.

FILING SYSTEM:

The State Master has instructed staff to develop and implement a central file system so that all Granges have a Master file with sub-files for property information, membership list, quarterly reports, and any other necessary information.

WEBSITE:

The State Master distributed an updated proposal from Headcase.com. It included an e-commerce site. Lewis questioned the security of the e-commerce site. A final decision will be made before the end of the year so that work can begin. Whatever contract is signed, it must contain:

- Security against hacking;
- CSG will sign off approval on every page individually in the whole storyboard prior to final approval of the site.

It was noted that today is Frank and Marian Nichols 49th anniversary that they are spending at an Executive Committee meeting. Happy Anniversary!

The meeting was recessed for the evening at 5:45pm.

Monday, December 13, 2004

Meeting was reconvened at 9am.

Attending were: Johnny Squire, Chair, Tom Sawyer, Marian Nichols, Inger Bevans, Bob Lange, Randy Lewis, Tom Stefenoni. Recording Secretary, Martha Stefenoni, Guest, Frank Nichols.

Legislative Bill Tracking

Two presentations on billing tracking systems were presented. Jeanie DuBose of CapWiz presented the CapWiz system. Their price is \$4500 per for the first year. Second and following years are \$2500. Tom Stefenoni presented the bill tracking system that will be provided by National Grange. The State Grange would have access provided at no charge.

A second user can be added for \$50 per month. We will begin using the National Grange system immediately. Any decisions regarding the CapWiz proposal will be made at the next meeting.

Subordinate Grange Requests:

Redwood Valley Grange - A request was received to use funds from their account to bring their bathrooms up to handicap standards. They anticipate the work t cost approximately \$55,000. **Moved by Lange, seconded by Sawyer to allow Redwood Valley to use part of their funds to upgrade the bathrooms up to \$55,000, provided they supply us with a copy of their minutes under seal. Motion Adopted unanimously.**

Monterey Bay Grange – Sister Bevans presented the application and all necessary documentation for a \$25,000 line of credit from the Grange Hall Loan Fund to make repairs necessary to bring the Hall up to a condition where it could be put up for sale. **Moved by Sawyer, seconded by Nichols to establish this line of credit for Monterey Bay Grange. Motion Adopted unanimously.**

Attorney, Tom Nickens arrived and the meeting moved into Closed Session. The Recording Secretary and guest were excused. The Master was directed to clear up the mistakes in the payment of vacation time and to correct accrued vacation hours. The Master was directed to proceed with the revocation of the West Visalia Grange and eviction of tenants.

SUBORDINATE GRANGE REPORTS (cont'd.)

ATASCADERO GRANGE: Bob Lange has been approached about an exchange for the Atascadero property. He will continue to be involved in process. Randy Lewis assisted him in getting the Hall insured.

CLEARLAKE GRANGE: Marian Nichols reported on the attempts to revive Clearlake Grange. On Monday, December 6th they elected officers. She feels the potential is there. They are out of funds and want to know what it will take to be reinstated? **Moved by Sawyer, seconded by Nichols that we need an updated membership list, and 1 quarter per capita payment, insurance premium deposit will be paid by the State Grange and added to their loan amount if necessary. Motion Adopted unanimously.**

COMMUNITY SERVICE REPORT:

Moved by Stefenoni, seconded by Sawyer to authorize payments to the Community Service Contest Award Winners. Motion Adopted unanimously.

Meeting adjourned for lunch. Tom Sawyer and Inger Bevans departed.

PROPERTY MANAGEMENT:

PARKING LOT: The irregular surfaces in the parking lot must be fixed. Bro. Hartz was instructed to get 2 bids: one to fill the holes and cracks and a second bid to resurface the entire parking lot with asphalt.

The office is continuing to have towed cars without proper ID that are parked in assigned, rented spaces.

FAIR VALLEY GRANGE (Chino, CA): An offer of \$300,000 has been received on the Fair Valley Grange Hall. **Moved by Lange, seconded by Lewis that we politely reject the offer. Motion Adopted unanimously.**

MUSCOY GRANGE: We are still receiving inquiries from the school district on the Muscoy Grange Hall property. In order to make an informed decision we need to find out what is happening regarding development of that area. Bro. Lewis will see what he can find out about the Muscoy community.

OAKDALE GRANGE: Deputy, Bud Hill will work with the State Master to see what can be accomplished with the Granges in this area.

JANESVILLE GRANGE: A determination is needed on how to sign the deed.

Meeting Minutes 1/ 28/05

The meeting was preceded by a tour of Monsanto's Calgene facility in Davis, CA on Friday morning, January 28, 2005. Jamie Spooner of Planeteria made a presentation on the new Web site at the CSG office at 12 noon.

Chairman Johnny Squire called the meeting to order at 2: 10pm.

Attending were Inger Bevans, Bob Lange, Marian Nichols, H. Tom Sawyer, Randy Lewis, Overseer, Tom Stefenoni, Master, Frank Nichols, guest and Martha Stefenoni, Recording Secretary.

Attorney, Tom Nickens joined the meeting, which moved to closed session. Closed session ended at 2:45pm. Bro. Jay Hartz and recording Secretary Martha Stefenoni joined the meeting.

Property Management - Jay Hartz:

Woodbridge Grange - The wind damaged the roof which is now leaking. Elk Grove is looking at assimilating Woodbridge Grange into Elk Grove Grange and using the Woodbridge Hall for the Grange Youth Fair program. **Moved by Lewis, seconded by Sawyer we get the roof repaired. VOTE: Ayes 6, Nay 1.**

Calaveras Grange Hall- Rental income is increasing but we aren't close to breaking even. A letter has been received from Faith Fellowship Family Bible Church inquiring if we were interested in selling the hall or if not selling the hall, if a lease-option or rental would be possible. **Moved by Lewis, seconded by Nichols that we send a letter to Faith Fellowship Family Bible Church thanking them for the inquiry but that we are not interested in selling the hall at this time but we would be pleased to discuss the rental possibility and allow them first right of refusal if we decided to sell. VOTE: Unanimous.**

Oakdale Grange - Oakdale Grange has surrendered its charter. The hall is being rented to a couple of dance groups and scout troops. There are funds in their account. Jay Hartz and Tom Stefenoni will set a time to go down and close out their accounts. The property deed for Oakdale Grange Hall is being transferred to the California State Grange.

Parking Lot – We are still seeking bids. One bid has been received. It was 2 separate proposals as follows:

- 1) Completely redo the parking lot - \$117,474 + \$1271.00 to restripe the parking spaces; or
- 2) To repair, fill, clean and asphalt the lot - \$3841.00 which would cover our short-term needs

The possibility of converting the triangle out front to 3 or 4 parking spaces was discussed. This possibility was not included in the one bid we received. The additional bidders will be asked to include a bid to convert the front triangle into parking. Once the additional bids are received they will be forwarded to the Executive Committee.

Muscoy Grange - There has been no change since the December 2004 meeting. There is a possibility that the School District may exercise eminent domain because they are considering a school in the neighborhood. Jay was instructed to obtain an appraisal of the property.

Fowler Grange - The State Grange is still holding Fowler Grange youth members' checks for Expo awards because the entries came in without addresses for those that entered the Expo. **Moved by Sawyer, seconded by Lange that Bro. Squire be allowed to take the checks to Fowler Grange youth. VOTE: Ayes 5, No 1, Abstain 1.**

Janesville Grange - Bro. Lewis is still working on getting the title transferred.

Orangeville Grange/Fair Oaks - The consolidation is completed and the accounts receivables and payable have been received.

Clearlake - The State Grange has received the quarterly report and per capita and have met all the conditions that were required to reinstate their Grange. Bro. Stefenoni will send a copy of the letter reinstating Clearlake Grange to Kathy Bergeron as insurance agent for Clearlake.

Monterey Bay - Inger Bevans reported that the Hall was listed on Jan. 22, 2005 for \$524,000. The roof is leaking so they have had it tarped. There have been several interested parties and they may have a bid next week. The lot line problem will be resolved in escrow.

Biggs Grange - Bro. Hartz suggested a lower sale price. There was no action taken at this time.

Atascadero Grange - Bro. Lange reported the value of the property was determined to be \$1.5 million (lot is 280 x 260). No one wants to sell.

San Jose Grange Scholarship - This is a CA State Grange administered scholarship. San Jose endowed a scholarship in their name with the scholarship amount to be determined by interest earned. The State Grange must administer this scholarship because there were so many stipulations place upon the endowment, the CA Grange Foundation could not administer it.

Insurance Claim on Parking Lot - A claim has been submitted to GIA. There was also a claim presented to the tenant that was putting on the seminar that the person who fell was attending.

Minutes:

Minutes of the Oct. 17,2004 meeting were corrected as follows: Line 44, first sentence should read: Squire turned the gavel over to Sawyer. Line 7, corrected the spelling of Sister Bevans name.

State Secretary Bergeron has requested a copy of the minutes once they are approved and signed. **Moved by Lewis, seconded by Nichols to send a copy of the Executive Committee meetings minutes that have been approved and signed to elected and installed State Grange officers and appointed State Directors.**

VOTE: Ayes 7.

Technology:

Server - State Master Stefenoni has asked Winnnet the questions raised by the Executive Committee at their last meeting. The response was as follows: The cabinet is so large because it will be used to not only house the server but also to store the software. This cabinet is locked and secure. For the time being we will retain the old server to keep the files that were stored on it until we are sure that all files have been successfully transferred.

Web Site Data Base and e-mail system - It was questioned if we are going to continue with the "grangeonline" domain name. It was suggested that we look for a new domain name.

Laptop Computer - Brother Squire found an excellent buy on a laptop for the State Master. After all the rebates have been received the cost will be \$1349.00 plus tax. This laptop has more capability and function than any the State Master had been able to find. Brother Squire purchased this laptop, software and peripherals on behalf of the California State Grange in consultation with the State Master. Brother Squire has been reimbursed by the State Grange.

Departmental Reports & Requests:

Grange Youth Fair _ The directors will be in on Saturday to report on the Western Fairs Assoc. Annual Meeting as well as the Pork Council Meeting in Las Vegas.

Convention Committee - Redding is all under contract. The State Master is sending out a letter about how convention once was financed and how that financing has dried up over time. It is an issue we need to address

Pierce College - Brother Lewis has been playing phone tag with them to find out about their Ag day.
Employee Handbook - Brother Lewis is still reviewing. The State Master has asked Attorney Nickens for a recommendation of a Labor Law Attorney to review the handbook once revisions are complete.

Executive Session:

The Committee went into Executive Session at 4:50 pm to discuss personnel issues. Bro. Nichols and the Recording Secretary were excused. Executive Session was closed at 5:45pm.

Departmental Reports & Requests (cont'd.):

Community Service - Sister Eyler wants the GW A to take over the Dictionary Project. She also wants to have a meeting of her Directors. Because Brother Jack had the flu she was unable to meet with the State Master in Sebastopol last week.

Dissolution Procedure - Sister Bevans had downloaded the forms from the Secretary of State's Web site that are necessary for dissolution. She gave the information to Corissa Young to be added to the information that comes from the State Grange when a Grange is planning to close.

Authorization to Pay Form - The State Master shared a form that would direct the bookkeeper to pay based on actions of the Executive Committee. They would like to see a "Purpose" line included. It was determined that the State Master would be the Authorized Signature.

Meeting was adjourned at 6: 10pm.

The National Grange Legislative tracking program comes at no charge to the State Grange and a second user can be added for \$50 for month. The Cap Wiz system would allow us to link with the new Web Site but the National Grange proposal will not. **Moved by Lange, seconded by Lewis that we subscribe to the Cap Wiz Legislative tracking program: \$2500 Annual Fee to be paid from the Legislative Department; and the one-time \$2000 set up fee will be paid from the Membership Development funds. The CSG Standing Water Committee, Leo T Bergeron, chairman, with Glenn Briggs, Howard Brophy, Dick Dahms, Kathy Lehman and Jerry Lehman, committee members met on a number of occasions to review and sanitize CSG water policy located in the CSG Legislative Policy Handbook and subsequent annual Journal of Proceedings, 2001, 2002, 2003, & 2004.

The Water Policy statement on page sixty five of the Legislative Policy handbook was reviewed and found to be a very effective general statement of CSG water policy. The membership is encouraged to locate a Legislative handbook and familiarize themselves with CSG water policy.

The review of the CSG water resolutions listed in the CSG Legislative Handbook found a number of duplication and contraridictions and it is the recommendation of this committee that they be corrected. The corrections are as follows;

Pg 66 # 5 A Subsidized water on farm operations of less that 960 acres (91).This is deleted as it is covered by resolution #18 (94)on page 67.

Pg 70 #21 Auburn Dam (87) # 25 Auburn Dam (87) deleted as both are covered by #26 Auburn Dam & Sugar Pine Dam (74)

Annual Journal 2002 Resolution # 02-056 title Water quality and safe drinking water project. CSG oppose passage of Proposition 50, no longer applicable Proposition 50 is no longer a viable proposition.

The CSG Water Committee produced a resolution and presented it to the membership titled "METERS ON WELLS". The resolution required that the CSG vigorously oppose any attempt to put meters on any private wells, personal or commercial (agriculture irrigation wells). The membership found the resolution favorable and is now Grange policy with instruction to the CSG to take all approximate action to prevent meters on private wells.

The action instigated by the CSG Standing Water to determine if the listing of the Coho Salmon as an endangered or threatened species was a legal listing was finalized the month . The results of a ruling by a Federal Court Judge is that the NMFS had lied on their application and that they did not include hatchery Coho in their listing as is required by the Endangered Specie Act (ESA), the ruling was that the listing was illegal as the NMFS violated the law in enacting the listing.

The chairman wishes to thank the members of the committee, Glenn, Howard, Dick, Kathy, and Jerry for their participation in the work of the committee, and the chairman wishes to thank the CSG for the opportunity to serve a chairman of this committee.

CONSERVATION AND ENVIRONMENTAL AFFAIRS

05-062 - Building Auburn Dam - Siskiyou Pomona #86

WHEREAS Forty years have passed since preparatory work was begun to build Auburn Dam, which included clearing trees and brush up to the planned water-line level, the construction of an expensive bridge between Auburn and Forest Hill at a height above the proposed lake, and other work, and

WHEREAS Considerable concern is currently expressed regarding flood prevention in the Sacramento area, and

WHEREAS Of the several proposed solutions to provide safety for the Sacramento area the construction of Auburn Dam appears most practical and less costly, therefore, be it

RESOLVED That the CSG support the construction of Auburn Dam and lobby accordingly.

EDUCATION

05-068 – Pledge of Allegiance Choice – Education Committee

WHEREAS A recent ruling by a federal appeals court prohibits all public school students from saying the Pledge of Allegiance in Sacramento County as it is unconstitutional because of the words “Under God”, and

WHEREAS The direction of this ruling and its initiator is heading for a national scope, and

WHEREAS Many states have reciting the Pledge as an education standard for teaching patriotism, and

WHEREAS This ruling is discriminatory against all students who want to be able to show their patriotism; therefore be it

RESOLVED The CSG reaffirm its school patriotism policy of: “Pledge of Allegiance and/or the Star Spangled Banner be included in the daily curriculum of the Public School System” [84], and be further

RESOLVED The CSG and National Grange supports any legislation to keep the reciting of the Pledge of Allegiance in our schools nationwide with the individual’s choice of saying the pledge with or without the words “Under God”.

05-073 – No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB) – Education Committee – Amended

WHEREAS The National Grange has an education policy statement in place regarding the Grange’s position on No Child Left Behind Act, (page 57 in the National Grange Policy Handbook).

Every child deserves to be well educated by well qualified teachers in a healthy, safe, and nurturing atmosphere with up-to-date technology and adequate telecommunications access. Our country is committed to educating every child. Children with special needs often require extra equipment and additional personnel. The cost of good education consumes a large percent of local tax dollars, and adequate funding for education is a constant concern. Federally mandated programs for special needs students must be funded at the 40% level which Congress originally intended. New federal programs and initiatives, no matter how well meaning, such as the No Child Left Behind Act, should be supported by federal funding and not by state and local tax dollars.

WHEREAS The language in this statement needs to be modified to require federal funding only; therefore

be it

RESOLVED The California State Grange include in their education policy statement the above statement but amend the last sentence to read as follows:

“ALL federal educational program initiatives required by federal government, no matter how well meaning, such as No Child Left Behind Act, MUST BE paid by federal funding and SHALL NOT BE paid by state and local governments,” and be it further

RESOLVED The California State Grange also include the following in the Education Policy under the heading of Education should read as follows:

“The California State Grange supports public education and the idea of strengthening and improving the system of Public Education. However, we believe that the No Child Left Behind Act is, in fact, counterproductive. We believe that every child should be able to receive a public education, and that the state is responsible for providing said educational programs that are not federally mandated.” And be it further

RESOLVED The California State Grange urges the National Grange to amend the last sentence of the second paragraph on of their Education policy to read as follows:

“ALL federal educational program initiatives required by federal government, no matter how well meaning, such as *No Child Left Behind Act*, MUST BE paid by federal government funds and SHALL NOT BE paid by state and local government funds.”

HEALTH

05-007 - Animals And Scientific Research - Gazelle Grange #380 - Amended

WHEREAS Animal rights advocates appear to be making progress in efforts to end the use of animals in medical research, and

WHEREAS Recent history has demonstrated the value of this research in the control of diseases and in saving lives of human beings; therefore be it

RESOLVED That the CSG and National Grange strongly support the continued use of animals in necessary medical research until a workable alternative is identified, and be it further

RESOLVED That every effort be made to render this research as humane as possible to the animals used and that this practice be carefully monitored.

05-009 - Focus On America's Aids Problem - Mccloud Grange #831 - Amended

WHEREAS We learn that AIDS takes the lives of 18,000 people daily world-wide, and

WHEREAS There is an increase in America in detection of HIV and AIDS in nearly all age groups, particularly the very young, therefore be it

RESOLVED That the CSG and National Grange urge appropriate government agencies at all levels that deal with the HIV and AIDS problem be more strongly funded, and be it further

RESOLVED That testing for AIDS and HIV be more strongly emphasized.

05-061 - Use Of Medical Marijuana – McCloud Grange #831 - Amended

WHEREAS Prescribed use of marijuana as a managed medicine has been helpful in the treatment of a number of severe illnesses (i.e. cancer, orthopedic damage, neurological problems) primarily in providing

pain relief, and

WHEREAS Previous Grange policy supports the use of medical marijuana in a non-explicit resolution, and

WHEREAS Recent U.S. Supreme Court action is in apparent conflict with States Rights and objectives, renders use of medical marijuana illegal, therefore, be it

RESOLVED That the CSG and the National Grange support the properly supervised medical use of marijuana by citizens suffering pain not previously relieved by other medications,

LEGISLATION

05-003 - Limiting Length And Scope Of Introduced Bills - Tulelake Grange #468

WHEREAS Bills presented in Congress have become so lengthy and entangled that it is impossible for the average citizen (or the Congressman themselves) to read and comprehend them, and

WHEREAS So many undesirable items are added as riders that are totally unrelated to a popular, desirable bill, and

WHEREAS The passing of the good bill consequently does great damage because of the hidden rider; therefore, be it

RESOLVED That all bills submitted to and acted upon by Congress be limited to one topic and no more than six pages long, including the title, and that no riders to the bill be allowed.

05-023R - Financing New Laws - Little Lake Grange #670

WHEREAS Lawmaking at the state level has become more frequent; and

WHEREAS No accountability has been assigned financially for implementation of such laws; and

WHEREAS The State has found itself in a deep financial hole because of this attitude; therefore, be it

RESOLVED That the CSG actively lobby the State lawmakers in Sacramento to submit a financial means of implementing all new laws within 180 days of passage or they become null and void.

05-027 - Abolish Federal Estate Tax - Siskiyou County Pomona #6

WHEREAS The Federal Estate Tax (known as the Death Tax) is the leading cause of dissolution for most small businesses, and

WHEREAS Seventy percent of businesses never advance beyond the first generation of owners, and

WHEREAS Americans agree that it is fundamentally wrong to tax property and earnings that have previously been taxed; therefore, be it

RESOLVED The CSG and National Grange lobby to completely eliminate the Federal Estate Tax.

05-039 - Government Taking Of Private Property - Greenhorn Grange #384

WHEREAS the fifth amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America states ". . . nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation"; and

WHEREAS legitimate "public use" has been historically limited to roads, utility lines, sewers, schools, etc., or to rid the community of a "blighted area", and

WHEREAS the Supreme Court of the United States in the case known as Kelo vs. New London in June of 2005 held in a 5 to 4 decision that local governments can seize private property and give it to private developers if it is determined that those development projects also serve a public purpose; and

WHEREAS the Grange agrees with Justice Sandra Day O'Connor who stated in her dissent that "under the banner of economic development, all private property is now vulnerable to being taken and transferred to another private owner"; therefore be it

RESOLVED that the California State Grange urge and support legislative action at every level of government to offset the decision of the Supreme Court of the United States in the case of Kelo vs. New London and maintain the limits historically held for the legitimate taking of private property .

PUBLIC POLICY

05-002R - Provide Notification Of Withheld Child Support - McCloud Grange #831

WHEREAS Currently by regulations enforced by California's Franchise Tax Board, banks withhold child support from individuals, usually fathers, who are in arrears with child support payments, and

WHEREAS Often, money is diverted from bank accounts for this purpose without the knowledge of the depositor, and

WHEREAS Sometimes money is diverted in situations in which the depositor has been making regular payments as required; therefore, be it

RESOLVED The CSG urge that legislation be enacted requiring that when money is diverted from a private account that the amount of the withdrawal, the name of the agency making the withdrawal, and the reason for the withdrawal be given to the account holder.

05-008 - Support Of Restructure Of The Pentagon - McCloud Grange #831

WHEREAS It has been established that the entity referred to as the Pentagon took 167 days to process a military order for bulletproof vests for our servicemen in Iraq, and

WHEREAS Weeks more passed before the servicemen received the vests and even then not all servicemen did receive needed vests. Therefore, be it

RESOLVED That the CSG and National Grange bring pressure to bear on the Government of the United States to carefully investigate the manner in which the staff employed in the Pentagon process the work assigned to them, and be it further

RESOLVED That our government act promptly to eliminate any "bottlenecks," duplication of services, and to correct all problems that impede getting work accomplished.

05-029R - Modification Of Social Security - :McCloud Grange #831

WHEREAS American citizens are aware of several proposals for the modification of Social Security, due to the danger of a funding shortage in years not too far ahead, and

WHEREAS discussion in several Granges does not show support for the proposals for changes being discussed by our National leaders none of which address the current practice of what we feel is misuse of Social Security monies; therefore be it

RESOLVED that the CSG and the National Grange reaffirm their existing policy concerning the protection of Social Security funds.

05-070 – War Dog Memorial – Public Policy Committee

WHEREAS More than one hundred thousand dogs of many different breeds faithfully served our country during WWI, WWII, the Korean War, Vietnam War, Gulf War, and the peacekeeping missions in Bosnia, Kosovo, and many other places; and

WHEREAS Our country's War Dogs have earned the right to be recognized and honored for their service and sacrifice for our nation's freedom, therefore, be it

RESOLVED That the CSG and the National Grange stand behind the National War Dogs Monument Committee in their efforts to build a War Dog Memorial.

WATER

05-072 - Meters On Wells - Water Committee

WHEREAS There are current attempts being made by governments and other entities to place monitors on private wells and/or exercise some level of control over private wells without first negotiating just compensation with the landowners; therefore be it

RESOLVED The California State Grange vigorously lobby and take all appropriate action against any attempt at any level of government or any other entity within any state to place meters on private wells, whether used for personal or commercial use.

GRANGE ACTIVITIES

05-010 - Clarify The Position Of CSG Lobbyist - Gazelle Grange #380. Amended

WHEREAS When the delegates voted at the 2004 Convention to eliminate the position of Executive Director, it was not clear to many members that that position had also covered the role of lobbyist, and

WHEREAS Most members regard the passage of resolutions as the most important function of the California State Grange Convention and assume lobbying will be carried out as necessary, and

WHEREAS Currently the State Master, though very qualified, is overloaded with many time-consuming responsibilities and probably does not have adequate time to lobby regarding adopted positions of the CSG Convention delegates, therefore be it

RESOLVED That henceforth the CSG may clearly identify a qualified lobbyist to follow up on issues of concern to Grangers.

05-012 - Amend Article 17.6 Of State By-Laws - Paradise Grange #490

WHEREAS Delegates to the previous state session voted to eliminate the Executive Director position, and

WHEREAS The By-laws of the State Grange were not amended to reflect this change, thus creating potential problems regarding the hiring of employees; therefore, be it

RESOLVED That Article 17.6 of the By-laws of the State Grange is amended to read:

17.6 Employees – The State Grange is authorized to hire such employees as are necessary for the operations of the State Grange and within the constraints of the annual budget as adopted by the delegates.

And that:

- a) The Master, with the advice and consent of the Executive Committee shall have the authority to hire, evaluate and terminate employees of the California State Grange.
- b) The basic compensation of all employees, who are not elected State Officers, shall be set by the Executive Committee.
- c) Annual Cost of Living adjustments may be granted by the Executive Committee, subject to any budgetary constraints that may apply.
- d) The Master and Executive Committee shall see that job description, duties, work conditions and employment policies shall conform to existing laws, rules and regulations regarding employees and shall be detailed in an employee handbook which shall be made available to each employee.

05-021 - Departmental Budget Forms - Orangevale Grange #354. Amended

WHEREAS The budget of the California State Grange is a comprehensive form, and

WHEREAS Department heads are expected to prepare a budget for their own department, and

WHEREAS Not all departments have the same budget requirements, therefore, be it

RESOLVED The California State Grange management provide the necessary forms and tools to department heads for budget purposes.

05-30R - Accountability Resolution - People For The USA Grange #835. Amended.

WHEREAS Countless action resolutions have been passed by the delegate body of the California State Grange, and

WHEREAS That delegate body has every right to expect action resolutions receive prompt action, and

WHEREAS Many action resolutions are either never acted upon, or no report of action(s) taken is ever made to the delegate body, including a 2004 resolution requiring such reporting, and

WHEREAS Directing and insuring actions to be taken is the responsibility of the CSG Master; therefore be it

RESOLVED The CSG Master will insure a progress report specific to each outstanding action resolution be printed in the Grange News and posted on the website, and a summary of each year's efforts and results be made available to the delegate body , and be it further

RESOLVED That Pomona Masters and Deputies are charged with monitoring the progress of outstanding action resolutions authorized by Grange members in their areas, and if no progress is given no later than 30 days past the time line specified within the resolution, they shall recommend to the California State Grange Executive Committee that they visit the CSG Digest of Laws, page 2-28, Section 17.1.

05-033 - California State Grange Budget - Orangevale Grange #354. Amended

WHEREAS The budget of the California State Grange is a comprehensive form, and

WHEREAS Delegates are expected to review, understand and vote on the budget often without having time for a proper review, therefore, be it

RESOLVED That the proposed annual budget shall be sent to each Pomona and Subordinate Grange Master and posted on the CSG website 45 days prior to the annual convention of the California State Grange.

05-034 - Freedom Of Information - Paradise Grange #490. Amended

WHEREAS The members of the Grange have a. right to all information that is not of a confidential nature., therefore be it

RESOLVED That any information requested by a member of the Order shall be provided to that member in a timely manner., except for information that is of a confidential nature.

05-036 - Adopt Student Grange Program - Paradise Grange #490

WHEREAS The National Grange Digest provides in Section 10.10.1 of the Code of All Granges for a Student Grange, which reads as follows;

"10.10.1 A Student Grange is directly under the supervision of the State Grange which shall have full authority to regulate procedures under which the Student Grange will operate." And

WHEREAS Youth are the lifeblood of any organization and are necessary for the revitalization of the Granges across California, and

WHEREAS These Student Granges may be organized under full authority of the State Grange, and under such rules as the State Grange may provide, therefore be it;

RESOLVED That the California State Grange does hereby adopt the proposed Rules and Regulations Pertaining to Student Granges (*see attached*) in order to implement the Student Grange Program, and be it further

RESOLVED That the Student Grange program may be used to advance any of the various Youth Programs (Grange Youth, Grange Fair Program and/or Junior Grange) as may be necessary to revitalize the Grange and Grange Youth Programs across the State of California.

05-040 - Mailing Of Executive Committee Minutes - Greenhorn Grange #384. Amended.

WHEREAS The delegates attending the annual session of the California State Grange have a maximum of 23 hours to read, digest and ask questions about the resolution packets they receive at registration, which includes the Executive Committee minutes for the preceding year, and

WHEREAS These few hours restrict the delegate's ability to digest the material received and formulate an intelligent vote; therefore, be it

RESOLVED That the adopted minutes of the Executive Committee for the year be mailed or e-mailed to the delegate/Granges 45 days prior to the beginning of the annual session.

05-043 - Master's Salary - Greenhorn Grange #384. Amended.

WHEREAS The salary of the Master of the CSG has been in a state of flux for the past few years, and

WHEREAS The impression of the position being full-time or part-time has been in question, and

WHEREAS The Delegate Body should determine the salary range for the State Master, therefore, be it

RESOLVED That the salary of the Master of the California State Grange be established at \$31,500.00 per year plus benefits and expenses as a full time position..

05-063 - Recording Executive Committee Votes - Quartz Hill Grange #697. Amended.

WHEREAS It is important to know how each member of the Executive Committee votes on any issue before the Committee, so that delegates can judge the effectiveness of Committee members; therefore be it

RESOLVED That all votes of the California State Grange Executive Committee shall be recorded as roll call votes.

05-071 - Activation Of The State-Wide Membership Director Position - Grange Activities Committee

WHEREAS It is in the best interest of our fraternal order to keep local Granges strong and growing, and membership development is the lifeblood of the Grange; therefore be it

RESOLVED That the Master of the California State Grange, working with the Executive Committee, shall immediately fill the position of Membership Director, and be it further

RESOLVED that the newly-appointed Membership Director will work within the pre-authorized budget to build membership, energize existing Granges and resurrect inactive Granges.

GRANGE LAW

05-005 - Adopt Family Membership And Provide Dues Paradise Grange #490

WHEREAS It has been the policy of the California State Grange since 1994 to have the National Grange adopt a family membership class of members, and this class of membership would benefit the California State Grange, and

WHEREAS The National Grange at its 2002 Annual Session adopted a family membership class of members; therefore, be it

RESOLVED That Section 4.2 of Article IV – Fraternal Membership Classes, be amended by adding a second paragraph to read:

“Family membership is available to any persons who qualifies for individual membership (see paragraph above) and meets the requirements of Section 4.6.5 of the National Grange By-laws.” And be it further

RESOLVED That Sections 10.1 subsection (b) of Article X – Funds, is amended by inserting the words “or family” after the word affiliate; and be it further

RESOLVED That Sections 10.2 subsection (b) of Article X – Funds, is amended by inserting “Family Membership dues shall be twice the amount for individual members.” At the end of the section.; and be it further

RESOLVED That Sections 10.3 subsection (b) of Article X – Funds, is amended by inserting “Family Membership dues to the State Grange shall be twice the amount for individual members.”

05-012 - Amend Article 17.6 Of State By-Laws - Paradise Grange #490

WHEREAS Delegates to the previous state session voted to eliminate the Executive Director position, and

WHEREAS The By-laws of the State Grange were not amended to reflect this change, thus creating potential problems regarding the hiring of employees; therefore, be it

RESOLVED That Article 17.6 of the By-laws of the State Grange is amended to read:

17.6 Employees – The State Grange is authorized to hire such employees as are necessary for the operations of the State Grange and within the constraints of the annual budget as adopted by the delegates. And that:

- A. The Master, with the advice and consent of the Executive Committee shall have the authority to hire, evaluate and terminate employees of the California State Grange.
- B. The basic compensation of all employees, who are not elected State Officers, shall be set by the Executive Committee.
- C. Annual Cost of Living adjustments may be granted by the Executive Committee, subject to any budgetary constraints that may apply.
- D. The Master and Executive Committee shall see that job description, duties, work conditions and employment policies shall conform to existing laws, rules and regulations regarding employees and shall be detailed in an employee handbook which shall be made available to each employee.

05-14R - Disposal Of Property Of Granges Surrendering Their Charters (05-014r)

WHEREAS Currently, Grange Law requires that when a Subordinate Grange votes to surrender their charter, after all efforts have failed to avoid such a decision, all Grange property, unless an alternative arrangement has previously been approved by the California State Grange, shall become property of the California State Grange. And

WHEREAS Grange Halls are one of our most valuable assets and every effort should be made to retain those assets for the future of the Grange; And

WHEREAS The loss of a Hall could have a negative impact on the community in which the Grange is located. Therefore, be it

RESOLVED That the CSG and the National Grange initiate changes in the National Grange By-laws, particularly Article XI, Sections 4.11.1, 4.11.2 and 4.11.3, recommending that subordinate Grange halls of Granges which surrender their charters be leased to local, community-based non-profit organizations for a nominal yearly consideration in exchange for the ongoing upkeep and maintenance of the hall until such time as the Grange can be reorganized.

05-016 - Amend Chapter Iv Of The By-Laws Of The National Grange– Paradise Grange - Amended

WHEREAS Communities are sometimes served by more than one Subordinate Grange, and

WHEREAS When one of these Granges goes inactive and is unable to be reorganized by the State Grange, its assets are disposed of, the monies are held in trust for the reorganization of that Grange, and the members blanket demitted into the other nearby Grange, and

WHEREAS Because there is another Grange serving the same community, it would be in the best interests of the community and the Grange to consolidate the members and assets of the inactive Grange into the active Grange, thus serving the purposes of the order and strengthening the surviving Grange; therefore be it:

RESOLVED That a new section be inserted in Chapter IV of the By-Laws of the National Grange, after section 4.4.2 to read as follows;

4.4.3 Special Consolidation Option - When a State Grange has determined that a Grange is inactive and efforts to restore it to an active status have failed, the State Grange may consolidate the inactive Grange with a nearby active Grange, provided that the Grange into which the inactive Grange will be consolidated:

(A) Is serving the same basic community as the inactive Grange

(B) Has mailed a notice of intent to consolidate to all of its members, at the members last recorded address, at least thirty days prior to any meeting at which a vote to consolidate is to be considered. At such meeting,

the question of the consolidation shall be decided by a majority vote of the members present and voting. It is further provided that the State Grange shall mail a notice of intent to consolidate to all of the members of the inactive Grange, at the members last recorded address, at least thirty days prior to a special meeting. If at this special meeting at least thirteen persons, of whom there shall not be less than four of either sex, shall desire to continue operation of the inactive Grange, the consolidation procedure shall be terminated, otherwise the charter of the inactive Grange shall be surrendered and the members and assets shall be transferred to the consolidating Grange. Such assets shall be used in accordance with the general purposes of the Order. And be it further

RESOLVED That existing section 4.4.3 to 4.4.5 be renumbered accordingly.

05-020 - Abolish Junior Grange State Dues - Rainbow Valley Grange #689

WHEREAS At the 2004 annual session of the National Grange, the delegates voted to abolish dues for Junior Granges (*pg 228 of the Journal of Proceedings of the 138th Session of the National Grange*); and

WHEREAS The State Grange did not retain any portion of the dues collected, merely forwarded them to the National Grange; therefore, be it

RESOLVED Section 10.3(a) of the By-Laws of the California State Grange be amended to read “Junior Granges – no dues required.” And be it further

RESOLVED Section 11.3 of the By-laws of the CSG be amended to read “The Secretary of each Junior Grange shall not be required to pay any sum as provided for in Section 10.3(a) Dues to the State Grange of these By-laws,” and be it further

RESOLVED These amendments be applied retroactively to January 1, 2005.

05-032 - State Grange Annual Meeting - Sonoma County Pomona Grange #1. Amended.

WHEREAS The current Digest of Laws of the California State Grange, **Section 12.4, Meetings, State Grange**, specifies that “the State Grange shall hold its regular meeting on the Second Thursday in October (after 2001)” which does not provide any flexibility in securing meeting facilities and lodging, and

WHEREAS Section 12.4 also states “The place of meeting will be determined by a majority vote of the delegate body at least two years in advance.” and has no provisions for selecting a meeting place if the delegate body does not select a meeting place, or if the place selected is later deemed unacceptable; therefore be it

RESOLVED The CSG Digest of Laws, **Section 12.4, Meetings, State Grange**, be amended to read as follows: “**12.4 State Grange** – The California State Grange Executive Committee shall set the date of the annual meeting, said meeting to be in the month of October and to commence on or before the 16th of the month. The place of meeting will be determined by a majority vote of the delegate body at least two years in advance. Should the State Grange adjourn without selecting the place of Meeting, the Executive Committee of the State Grange shall determine the place of meeting for the State Grange and notify the Secretary of the State Grange and Masters of the Subordinate and Pomona Granges 60 days prior.

If for any reason the selected place of meeting is later deemed by the Executive Committee to be unacceptable, it will be the responsibility of the Executive Committee of the State Grange to secure a suitable meeting place and promptly notify the Secretary of the State Grange and Masters of the Subordinate and Pomona Granges.”

05-054 - Alcoholic Beverages - Executive Committee. Amended.

WHEREAS The National Grange has amended Section 10.11.1 of the By-laws. Therefore, be it

RESOLVED Article XXIII, Section 23.1 of the By-laws of the California State Grange,

“Alcoholic Beverages,” be amended to read:

“All Granges are prohibited from serving/consuming alcoholic beverages either in the Grange Hall or on any Grange Property during any Grange business meeting.”

05-058 - Relocation Of CSG Headquarters CSG Executive Committee. Amended.

WHEREAS The current By-laws contains no provision for the relocation of the California State Grange office under any circumstances, therefore, be it

RESOLVED Article 1, Section 1.1 of the California State Grange By-laws “Principal Office” be amended to read:

The principal office of the California State Grange shall be located at 2101 Stockton Blvd., Sacramento, California, or other location within 25 miles of Sacramento or as determined by the Executive Committee

NOTE 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The California State Grange (the Grange) was incorporated on October 7, 1946 under the laws of the State of California as a nonprofit corporation. The Grange is subject to and governed by the constitution of the National Grange. The Grange is a fraternal, family, and community service organization seeking to preserve agricultural heritage and traditions.

Basis of Accounting: The financial statements of California State Grange have been prepared on the accrual basis and accordingly reflect all significant receivables, payables and other liabilities.

Basis of Presentation: Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 117, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets.

Fund Accounting: To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Grange, the accounts of the Grange are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes to funds established according to their nature and purpose. Separate bank accounts are not maintained for each fund. The following is a brief summary of each funds' activity and purpose:

General Fund: Accounts for all transactions of the Grange not accounted for in the other funds. The funds are unrestricted, however, unrestricted funds are used to pay expenses of the restricted funds and a due to/due from is recorded in both the general fund and respective restricted fund.

Deaf Activities Fund: Provides resources for Grange members to act as advocates for deaf and hard of hearing people; promoting deaf awareness (education about deafness, hearing and the need for hearing protection); affording leadership for county, local and Junior Granges; providing community service to organizations benefiting the deaf; donating time, efforts, skill, equipment and funds to better fulfill the needs of the deaf community. Funds are donated and occasional fundraisers are held. Donations are disbursed through a separate entity, the California Grange Foundation. The Deaf Activities Fund Committee expenses are paid through the Deaf Activities Fund.

Fund Accounting (Continued):

Extension / Membership Development Fund: Provides resources for the internal and external promotion of the Grange and for education of members about the Grange. Income sources include donations from affiliates. Expenditures include tokens of appreciation, promotional prizes, Officer/Deputies supplies, and membership director expenses. The fund is also holding Emergency Relief Effort donations received by the Grange.

Convention Fund: This fund was created so an accurate accounting could be made of the Convention income and expenses. The Convention is the annual policy making session where representatives from each Grange statewide attend. The delegates provide resolutions for the good of their community, county, state and nation. These funds are unrestricted.

Rental Fund: This fund was created to account for properties owned by the State Grange that are leased to provide additional income. These funds are unrestricted.

Grange News Fund: This fund was created to account for the properties of the official publication of the California State Grange. It is issued bimonthly, providing an information link to the 30,000 plus members statewide. These funds are unrestricted.

Youth Fund: Provides resources for activities oriented towards younger members. Income sources include donations, conference fees and resale proceeds. Expenditures include conferences, director expenses, youth and young adult officers and ambassadors expenses, meetings, camp, coordinating council and fundraisers. These funds are restricted for these purposes.

Conference Center Fund: Provides resources for the promotion of camp and conference facilities. Funds are being collected to build or purchase grounds/complex for a combined center for conferences, camps and conventions. These funds are restricted for this purpose.

Junior Grange: Provides resources for activities oriented toward children ages 5 through 14. The fund sponsors programs for children to become involved in community activities, fair programs, and learning situations all involved with the Grange. "Junior Granges" are independent though affiliated with a Subordinate Grange. These funds are restricted for this purpose.

Grange Women's Activities Fund (GWA): Provides resources for activities oriented to-wards female members. The programs of the GWA give women opportunities to participate in community services, and educate others in many ways. Income is derived from the sale of cookbooks Expenditures include directors expenses to plan programs, organize contests and sponsor events. These funds are restricted for this purpose.

Grange Youth Fair Program: Enables Junior Grangers and Grange Youth members, ages 5 through 22, the opportunity to display their talents at local, county, and state fairs. These funds are restricted for this purpose.

Grangers Business Organization: Established for the purpose of holding proceeds, from the sale of the dissolution of the former Grangers Business Organization. These funds are restricted for this purpose.

Office Contingency: Established to provide emergency funds for the Grange to cover un-foreseen events. These funds are restricted for this purpose.

Grange Hall Loan Fund: Established to loan funds to local Granges to assist in their development or improvement of Grange Halls. These funds are restricted for this purpose.

Capitalization and Depreciation Policy: All expenditures for land, buildings and equipment and the fair market value of donated land, buildings, and equipment are capitalized. These assets are stated at cost or fair market value, if donated. The cost of repairs and maintenance are charged to an expense account as incurred. Significant renewals and replacements are capitalized. Depreciation is computed by the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the related assets:

Inventory: The inventory consists of cookbooks, various publications, jewelry, and supplies and is valued at cost on the first-in, first-out method.

Statement of Cash Flows: The Grange considers all highly liquid debt instruments purchased with a maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents. The Grange had no cash equivalents at December 31, 2004.

Donated Services: A substantial number of unpaid volunteers have made significant contributions of their time in conjunction with the Grange programs and services. The value of the contributed time is not included in these financial statements, since it is not susceptible to objective measurement.

Income Taxes: The Grange is a corporation exempt from federal income taxes under Internal Revenue Code section 501(c)(8) and is exempt from state income taxes under California Revenue and Taxation Code Section 23701(1). The Grange may be subject to income taxes on unrelated advertising and membership list revenue over related expenses. No provision for income taxes is made in the accompanying financial statements.

NOTE 2 – Asset Management Account

The By-Laws of the National Grange stipulate that proceeds from the sale of real property belonging to a Subordinate or Pomona Grange shall be transferred to the State Grange having jurisdiction to be restricted and held in trust for said Subordinate or Pomona Grange. All income derived from such Trust shall be the property of the selling Subordinate or Pomona Grange. The State Grange may be paid up to 5% of the earned income as a trustee's fee for administering the Trust. During the period ending December 31, 2004, the Grange earned \$2,291 in administration fees.

Funds received from discontinued or dormant Granges, are held in trust by the Grange for the benefit of the inactive Granges in the event said Grange is reorganized. The by-laws provide that such funds revert to the State Grange after seven years. The Grange is entitled to 100% of the income during this seven-year period.

The Trust Assets are restricted for the beneficial use of each respective surrendered charter or active grange, respectively.

NOTE 5 - Compensated Absences

Employees of the Grange are entitled to paid vacation and sick leave depending on job classification, length of service and other factors. At December 31, 2004 the accrued expense for compensated absences was \$11,952. The maximum amount of vacation that can be accumulated is 40 hours. Sick days accumulate, but are forfeited when employees leave the Grange. The maximum amount of sick leave that can be accumulated is 720 hours.

NOTE 6 - Pension Plan

The Grange adopted a defined contribution pension plan covering all full-time employees after completion of any hours of continuous service. Employees must be employed for three months to be eligible for the plan. This plan is fully funded by the Grange which contributes 5% of gross wages towards the purchase of an annuity for the benefit of the employee. All employees qualify for 100% vesting. Contributions for 2004 totaled \$9,302.

NOTE 7 - Operating Lease

The Grange is obligated under a long-term operating lease for its mailing system, its phone system, its folding machine and its collator system. The leases have an original term of sixty months expiring July 30, 2006, December 31, 2007, and December 31, 2008 respectively. The payments under the leases are \$1,211.28, \$258.66, \$331.77 and \$351.27 respectively. The balance of the lease commitments are as follows:

Notes to Financial Statements

NOTE 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The California Grange Foundation was created as a nonprofit corporation. The purposes of the corporation are to provide educational activities to the public concerning the preservation of the agricultural heritage and traditions of California and of America, through publications, workshops, assisting in research, and to provide educational assistance in the form of scholarships. The California Grange Foundation is affiliated with the California State Grange.

Basis of Accounting: The financial statements of the California Grange Foundation have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and accordingly reflect all significant receivables, payables and other liabilities.

Investments: The Foundation adopted SFAS No. 124, "Accounting for Certain Investments Held by Not-For-Profit Organizations," in 1996. Under SFAS No. 124, investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are valued at their fair values in the statement of financial position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets.

Basis of Presentation: Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 117, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets.

Fund Accounting: To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Foundation, the accounts of the Foundation are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified according to their nature and purpose. Separate bank accounts are not maintained for each fund. The following is a brief summary of each funds' activities and purpose:

General Fund: Accounts for all transactions of the Foundation not accounted for in other funds. These funds are not restricted.

Youth Fund: Accounts for Youth activity transactions of the Foundation not accounted for in other funds. These funds are not restricted.

Junior Fund: Accounts for Junior Activity transactions of the Foundation not accounted for in other funds. These funds are not restricted.

Deaf Activities Fund: A health project designed to educate and serve deaf and hard of hearing people. These funds are restricted.

Sehlmeyer Fund: Established for the purpose of aiding, through college scholarships, the education of the Grangers. These funds are restricted.

Doris Deaver Fund: Established for the purpose of aiding, through college scholarships, the education of Grangers. These funds are restricted.

Dixon Fund: Established for the purpose of aiding through college scholarships, the education of children. These funds are restricted.

Marinoff Fund: Established for the purpose of aiding through college scholarships, the education of children. These funds are restricted.

George Dupray Fund: Established for the purpose of aiding through college scholarships, the education of children interested in legislative issues. These funds are restricted.

FFA Building Fund: Established for the purpose of building an FFA building for the children involved in the fair programs.

Donated Services: Volunteers have made contributions of their time in conjunction with Foundation functions. The value of the contributed time is not included in these financial statements, since it is not susceptible to objective measurement.

Statement of Cash Flows: The Foundation considers all highly liquid debt instruments purchased with a maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents. At December 31, 2003, the Foundation had no cash equivalents.

Income Taxes: The Foundation is a corporation exempt from federal income taxes under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) and is exempt from state income taxes under California Revenue and Taxation Code Section 23701(g). No provision for income taxes has been made in the accompanying financial statements.

NOTE 2 - Investments – Morgan Stanley

Investments – Morgan Stanley are stated at market value. At December 31, 2004, the cost and market value of the funds were as follows:

NOTE 3 - Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

NOTE 4 – USDA Grant

The Foundation obtained a USDA grant to assist a subordinate grange to make needed repairs to their grange hall. This is a reimbursement grant, whereby as costs are incurred, the Foundation pays the invoices and prepares a monthly reconciliation which is sent to the USDA along with the invoices for reimbursement.

NOTE 1 - Significant Accounting Policies

Purpose

The California State Grange has created an informal trust to hold and administer funds that belong to active Granges and funds resulting from the surrender of Grange Charters. All funds in the asset management account are restricted and must be administered in accordance with the National Grange By-Laws.

Basis of Accounting : The financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and accordingly reflect all significant receivables, payables and other liabilities.

Statement of Cash Flows: The Trust considers all cash on demand and certificates of deposit accounts to be cash and cash equivalents.

Asset Restriction: As disclosed in Notes 2 and 3, the assets of the Asset Management Account are restricted for the beneficial use of each respective Surrendered Charter or Active Grange, respectively.

NOTE 2 - Surrendered Charters:

Funds received from discontinued or dormant Granges are restricted and held in trust for the benefit of the inactive Granges in the event said Grange is reorganized. The by-laws require such funds to revert to the California State Grange after seven years. The California State Grange is entitled to 100% of the investment income during this seven year period. These funds are reported as both an asset and a liability on the financial statements of the California State Grange as restricted funds.

NOTE 3 - Active Granges:

The By-Laws of the National Grange stipulate that proceeds from the sale of real property belonging to an active Subordinate or Pomona Grange shall be transferred to the State Grange having jurisdiction to be restricted and held in trust for said Subordinate or Pomona Grange. All earned income derived from such funds shall be the property of the selling Subordinate or Pomona Grange.
